The T is Time — time to get cracking and make that Triple Zero call for an ambulance.

Stroke is always a medical emergency, there is never time to waste.

Every minute during a stroke results in 1.9 million brain cells dying, and we just cannot turn that time back.

Treatment can, however, mean a full recovery, or at least, a significant reduction in the degree of disability.

This Stroke Week we saw numerous Australian landmarks light up in our blue and green colours to support our messages.

From Ballarat to Albury, Coffs Harbour to Perth, Melbourne to Brisbane, we were so thrilled to see our colours shining from towers, civic buildings, bridges and even the Big



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Countdown on for Bay Road completion

TRAFFIC should be back on Bay Road, Moonta Bay, by the end of September.

Copper Coast Council director infrastructure Tim Neumann said contractor Downer had finalised works behind the kerb in stages one and three and the shared path in those zones were ready for sealing.

"The additional 90-degree car park extension near Tossell Street is complete and ready for sealing," Mr Neumann

"Downer's civil contractor has completed road cut and fills to stage one and stage

three and Downer has mobilised the stabilisation crew to site and has begun work in stage three.

"Stormwater installation works are continuing on the main line and have progressed past the Bartlett Street intersection.

"The main stormwater line was completed at the end of

July.
"Kerbing preparation and ing this, the laying is following this, the concrete contractors have progressed well over the past month.

"CME's contracted works are nearing completion, some minor stormwater branch lines and kerbing preparation and laying in stage two are all that remain."

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said the next stage would be undergrounding powerlines which shouldn't affect or inconvenience motorists too much.

"Bay Road looks fantastic like it should as a main thoroughfare," Mrs Talbot said.

There have been delays, through no fault of anyone, and we appreciate the cooperation and patience of the community.

"I think everyone will find the road has been well worth the wait and is an overall great outcome for the Moonta community."

Once the contractors have finished their works in September, council will go in to vegetate the median strips, and the undergrounding of powerlines should begin at the end of November.

The total cost of the project is \$7,826,449.



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Ramp plans out for feedback

LONG sought-after plans for a major upgrade to the Marion Bay boat ramp are now available for public comment.

Yorke Peninsula Council, whose elected members formally received the designs at its August meeting, is seeking feedback about the plans.

The design features a six metre wide ramp for large boats, a 4m wide ramp for small-to-medium boats, a walkway and wave calming infrastructure.

The designs were created in collaboration with Magryn and Associates' managing director Terry Magryn and Department of Infrastructure and Transport offi-

The concept is considered an ideal compromise balancing affordability, environmental considerations and functionality for users.

"It is extremely pleasing to see major progress on the plans to upgrade Marion Bay's boat launching facility," Mayor Darren Braund said.


"The latest plans are considered a fantastic compromise which will improve the facility for users without causing excessive impacts to the environment, and the look and usability of the beach.


At a scheduled hearing in June, his legal team asked the court to consider the admissibility of the travel claims due to parliamentary privilege.

BWC progresses Top of the Yorke region

BARUNGA West Council has adopted its 2022-23 Annual Business Plan and Budget.

Maintaining and upgrading existing roads, kerbside waste collection and parks and gardens maintenance are some of the key focuses entering for the new financial year.

Council's total revenue has been forecast to be \$7.8 million, including \$5.4m in rates — a \$241,000 increase on last year - and \$939,000 in grant funding.

Council also approved a five per cent increase in total rate revenue to cover service and program costs, which was the lowest on Yorke Peninsula this financial year.

Primary producers in the region will also pay 50 per cent less than the base residential rate, while BWC is also one of the few councils to have reduced the cents in the dollar rates.

\$500,000 payment Fisherman's Bay

Management was also expected for council's open space contribution during the Fisherman Bay freeholding project.

A capital spend of about \$6m in major projects has been planned, including an upgrade to the Bute Community Management System, main street upgrades and fishing infrastructure.

CEO Maree Wauchope said the annual business plan delivered a responsible budget while maintaining an ambitious and exciting vision for the Top of the Yorke region.

'Council is overseeing the delivery of a range of projects while also bringing council's assets up to standards and ensuring its financial sustainability, including reaching an operating surplus by 2028," Ms Wauchope said.

"There are some important and exciting projects planned for the coming year, including about \$17m in works being undertaken at Fisherman Bay, funded by

an infrastructure deed between council and the developers.

"Port Broughton's Civic Square will be upgraded to make the area more inviting for the community and visitors, while a \$390,000 grant will help upgrade Bute's open spaces.

"We will also be delivering main street improvements and continuing to work on coastal protection solutions.

"More than \$500,000 will be spent on a new fishing pontoon for Port Broughton's jetty and new amenities at the Port Broughton boat ramp.

"Council will continue to progress plans for a new \$1.2m Tourism and Events Centre at Port Broughton, with hopes of securing funding of \$600,000 to proceed.

"All of these projects will deliver economic benefits and ultimately position our region as one of the most attractive residential and holiday destinations in the

A 34-YEAR-OLD Wallaroo man has been jailed after forcing a child to pose for naked photographs.

The man pleaded guilty to maintaining an unlawful sexual relationship with a child and was sentenced to five years and nine months imprisonment in the Adelaide District Court last

Police uncovered the man's actions after finding 42 child exploitation images on his phone.

The court heard the man had restrained a 6-year-old child with tape before taking naked photos of her on one occasion. A non-parole period of three years was set.

Ogar to face Supreme Court

Fatality free days sign

YORKE Peninsula's fatality free days sign has been revived.

A new sign was installed in late July on the Copper Coast Highway after malfunctioning early last year.

The sign will display how many days have passed without a fatality on Yorke Peninsula roads, despite incorrect numbers recently being displayed since its re-installation.

It has been in operation since 2004 to encourage road users to be aware of their behaviour and create public interest in road safety.

Department Infrastructure and Transport spokesperson said the initiative had been strongly supported by local councils and community road safety groups.

"The Fatality Free Sign on the Copper Coast Highway is another road safety awareness tool to remind all drivers to take responsibility for their own safety and the safety of others on our roads," the spokesperson

"It only takes one poor decision or mistake to cause a devastating outcome on the road.

"The department urges all road users travelling on Yorke Peninsula — and all country roads across the state - to take care, plan their journey and take a break every two hours to ensure you are rested and alert.

"It is important to always drive to the conditions, within the speed limit, and to pay attention to other road users, so everyone gets home safely."

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis said it was wonderful to see the sign operational again.

"It is always a helpful reminder to drive safely and for visitors to the region about the importance of maintaining our good record of road safety," he

"Of course, the most important thing we can do for road safety is continuing to fix the

"Barunga West ratepayers will have the opportunity to elect nine elected members to represent their interests and needs, before the mayor and deputy mayor will be chosen by those members," Ms Wauchope said.

"Being a councillor isn't a fulltime job, but it will mean attending meetings and information sessions outside normal business hours.

"Councillors are also required to attend committees or serve on external committees as representatives.

"The role of councillor is a rewarding one, but candidates need to be aware of the responsibility and time commitment required."

BWC elected member candidate information sessions are set to be held at its Port Broughton council chambers from 6pm tonight (Tuesday, August 16) and at the Bute Soldiers' Memorial Hall from 6pm tomorrow (Wednesday).

Ratepayer voting packs will be distributed in late October and should be returned by November

CCC CEO Russell Peate said, if people wanted to contribute to the Copper Coast community and make a difference, the best way was to nominate for council.

"Copper Coast Council has a diverse range of services which are provided to the community and is one organisation that deals so much with people and their needs," Mr Peate said.

"I would very much encourage anyone considering nominating for council to attend one of our briefing sessions to better understand what is involved, as well as the time commitments of an elected mem-

"Even if you don't end up nominating, attending a briefing session is a great way to get an idea of what is expected of a councillor."

YPC CEO Andrew Cameron said becoming an elected member was one of the most direct ways to make a difference in your commu-

"Councillors are responsible for making decisions about services locals use every day from libraries and playgrounds to roads and recycling," Mr Cameron said.

FOGO bins rolled out across Barunga West

KERBSIDE bin lid replacements have officially commenced across Barunga West Council.

The replacement stage was postponed from Monday, August 8, to yesterday (Monday, August 15) due to Covid-19-induced delays.

The process is set to be completed by August 30, ahead of council's new kerbside collection program which will start on September 1.

Three new bin lids will include a red lid for landfill, yellow for recycling and lime green for Food Organic and Green Organic, with descriptions of the items acceptable in each bin.

Next month, households will transition to a fortnightly collection of one 140-litre landfill bin on Mondays, as well as 240L recycling and 240L FOGO bins fortnightly on Fridays.

Collection of the dark green-lidded paper and cardboard bin will also cease, with these items compostable through either the recycling or FOGO

Council announced it would not be removing the paper and cardboard

New 8L kitchen caddies, each with 150 compostable bin liners, will be provided to households free of charge after council received \$17,000 in funding through Green Industries SA's Kerbside Performance Plus Food Organics Incentives Program.

Manager for assets and infrastructure Steve Davey said he was confident residents would embrace the new waste collection program given its long-term benefits.

"This might initially feel like a big change for some households, but experience from across the state shows people quickly adapt and reap the benefits," Mr Davey said.

"Reducing our waste is important as landfills are filling up and the costs, which are passed on directly to ratepayers, are rising.

"We believe the majority of households will use our FOGO waste service to turn their food waste, otherwise destined for landfill, into compost."

Council has implemented exceptional circumstance conditions to meet the needs of large families, those with children in nappies or living with a medical condition which produces extra waste.

Applications for exceptional circumstance waivers can be made at a council office, where any members of the public can discuss the new fortnightly rollout.

Dr Leonard said many of the items on display across the town would be accessible long after the weekend was finished.


"We encourage visitors to come and enjoy the new gardens, historical information and sculptures located in and around the Heart of Maitland," she said.

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Stormwater works start on George Street

THE \$600,000 stormwater project on George Street, Moonta, started on Monday August 8.

George Street will receive 500 metres of new stormwater drain between Ellen and Henry Streets with works expected to take about 12 weeks, weather permitting.

Copper Coast Council CEO Russell Peate said installation of underground stormwater infrastructure would reduce the on-street stormwater run-off, reducing the risk of localised flooding.

"There is a series of side entry pits being introduced into the intersections of Ellen and George Streets, and Henry and George Streets which will collect stormwater and feed this into concrete pipes and box culverts," Mr Peate said.

"These (concrete pipes and box culverts) connect through a series of junction boxes which are used for maintaining the network.

"This section of stormwater is connected to the existing stormwater infrastructure previously installed along George Street which discharges into McCauley Ponds.

"These previous works and those completed in 2021, near Foodland, will complete the stormwater infrastructure for George Street, allowing further upgrades above the ground

to be planned in line with the Moonta Master Plan."

Mr Peate said footpaths would remain accessible, allowing pedestrian movements and access to the retail outlets.

"It is intended, by council, to try to limit the road closures where possible and the contractor is trying to keep the work zones to a reduced size to minimise inconvenience," he

"The size of the plant required to undertake these works won't allow for vehicular movements to be in conjunction in the same zone, this is due to the safety of the public, contractor and their staff."

Mayor Roslyn Talbot said it was



PORT Broughton residents have been forced to say goodbye to the town's iconic big yellow ducks.

The three fibreglass ducks resided on a Crown Land allotment between 2 and 6 John Lewis Drive for more than 11 years.

Barunga West Council decided to remove the ducks due to deterioration and poor upkeep of the

Port Broughton Sailing and Boat Club received council permission in 2011 to display the ducks, sculpted by Melbourne artist David Doyle, to promote the Port Broughton Annual Rubber Duck

Club secretary and treasurer Tricsha Nurk said she was saddened and disappointed to see the

"The ducks have hardly deteriorated and we've never had any vermin," she said.

'There's a bit of overgrowth at the back of the block but we've had to maintain the land enough for kids to be able to run up and visit the ducks.

'When asked to move some materials off the land, we complied, so this is a very disappointing

"The sailing and boat club has also used the land to park our boats for 22 years, so we're concerned we won't be able to use it at all now."

Ms Nurk said the club has had many people ask where the ducks have gone.

"The ducks had become very popular to locals and visitors to Port Broughton — they provided a bit of joy many people needed to brighten their day, especially during Covid-19," she said.

"People driving to the (Broughton Bayside) Caravan Park would stop to take photos and there were often kids who would run up to have a look at the ducks.

"They had become an iconic part of the area and seemed to appeal to everyone — we will miss them very much."

Council CEO Maree Wauchope said the land had been the subject of many complaints of unsightly materials, overgrown vegetation and vermin.

"There is no lease or permit with the sailing club for the ducks and boats to be stored on this land," Ms Wauchope said.

"Sadly, the weather and lack of upkeep of the ducks have led to their deterioration.

"The block has now been cleared which will be of some relief to surrounding residents.

"I have reached out to the owners of the ducks offering them the opportunity to relocate them to council land with more protection from the weather."

The three ducks have since been shifted to a club member's property until a new site is found.



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
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Ultra-challenge arriving on Yorke Peninsula

A NEW 500 kilometre race is coming to Yorke Peninsula later this month.

Sink or Survive has been touted as the ultimate Southern Hemisphere stage race, with 24 participants completing the ultra-marathon along the Walk the Yorke Trail from Sunday, August 21, to Saturday, August 27.

The Yorke Peninsula race is one of 20 that the organisers host each year and is the longest they've ever held.

"The course takes in the whole trail, so it's 500km from Port Wakefield to Moonta, where our finish line will be set up at Queen Square," event director Shaun Kaesler said.

"Participants have 23 hours to complete each stage and the stages are roughly 50km to 98km.

"The great thing about this event is, each day, the whole group will stay at the same venue, before getting up and doing the next stage the next day so it allows for real bonding in the downtime.

Mr Kaesler said the Walk the Yorke trail will

provide a unique experience for traditional ultramarathon runners.

"Normally an ultra-marathon will consist of a combination of hill-based terrain and coast, but in this instance it's really flat," he said.

"The idea is it will be quite mentally and physically challenging, especially as we've never done a race this long before."

Mr Kaesler said he hopes a lasting connection can be made with the area and turn it into a reg-

"Being from country South Australia myself, I know the importance of events like this so that's why we're deliberately taking it back out to those regions to give a boost," he said.

"We've got an opportunity for participants to boost the local economy by staying at caravan parks, shopping at local stores and eating at local

"The great thing about the track we're taking is it includes the majority of the peninsula, so almost everyone gets seen to."



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Be mindful of assistance dogs

A MINDDOG is not your typical assistance dog.

A mindDog is a psychiatric service dog to help people who suffer with mental health issues such as anxiety and depression.

Minlaton's Helen Hammond has had her mindDog Matilda since puppyhood and wants to educate more people about them and what they do.

"I want people to know a mindDog is a trained, tested and certified service dog," she

"A lot of people recognise Seeing Eye Dogs, especially down the street or in cafes, and I just want people to know mindDogs are certified and have the same rights — even if they look different."

Helen said there had been multiple occasions where she and Matilda had been removed from local eateries or asked to sit in less busy areas.

"I think people see a small dog and don't believe she is an assistance dog — even when I show them my certification card," she said.

"Most recently, at a local cafe, I was asked to sit away from the counter so dog hair wouldn't go everywhere - I wasn't able to order so I just

"For someone with mental health problems this can be embarrassing and triggering.

"I just want people to understand a disability doesn't always have to be physical, it can be mental.

"If more people tried to understand, maybe everyone would be more accepting and not so quick to judge?

Helen said Matilda had saved her life on more than one occasion.

"Matilda is my family, I take her everywhere, she means everything to me — she helps me daily and calms me down if I have panic attacks," she said.

"I really encourage people to come up to me and ask about Matilda if they have questions rather than jumping to conclu-

What is a mindDog?

A MINDDOG is a psychiatric assistance dog.

An assistance dog is covered by the Commonwealth Disability Discrimination Act 1992.

They are trained to assist their handler in public and are guaranteed access to all public places including shopping centres, hospitals, public transport and restaurants.

According to the Act, an assistance dog is trained to alleviate the effect of a disability and must meet standards of hygiene and

For individuals with a mental health disorder and a dog, mindDog will test that dog for suitability, oversee the training, test, and certify that dog as an assistance dog.

The dogs are tested yearly with a mindDog trainer.



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Copper Coast holds place in Captain Karen's heart

CAPTAIN Karen Armstrong has moved on from The Salvation Army Copper Coast Corps after five years of serving the local community.

A change in appointments by The Salvation Army has meant Karen has relocated to Adelaide, where she will work on a range of projects before being dispatched interstate later this year.

"I'm very willing to go wherever the (Salvation) Army decides," she said.

"Working as a captain is a sacrificial role, but is one I thoroughly enjoy."

Karen was born into a fifthgeneration Salvationist family in England and said she was called to become a minister at just 14 years old.

Growing up in Yorkshire, East London, Karen said she was surrounded by family and friends, most of whom still reside in England.

Karen decided to move to Australia, where a 25-year career in the medical industry took Karen to a range of hospitals in Victoria, before she finally decided to study and become a minister.

Karen said her study life brought about many chal-

"I studied full-time for three

and a half years whilst raising three children and, as a single mother, this was tough but very rewarding," she said.

"I was also on deck on Sundays, visiting different churches in the neighbour-

Upon completing her studies, Karen was appointed as Salvation Army Captain in Macleod, Victoria, where she was based for four years before being dispatched to Tasmania for another four years.

Karen was then given an opportunity to return to Victoria briefly before being appointed as captain of Salvation Army Oakden Corps, South Australia, and finally to

"Each appointment has brought its challenges, but I've had so many good times and been able to see so much of Australia," Karen said.

"While based in Kadina I travelled as much as I could, including many trips down Yorke Peninsula."

During her time as local captain, Karen opened counselling rooms, secured a Salvation Army van which is used to pick up unwanted furniture, attracted multiple paid staff members, increased the corps' volunteer base, secured multiple grants, as well as many other improve-

Karen said she always

believed in the work she was doing for the local community, which mainly involved operating counselling, church and op shop services whilst at the Copper Coast corps.

When I first came to the Copper Coast, I realised I was going to have to roll up my sleeves and get to work," she

"I've been so proud of all our volunteers who used their expertise to work in a team.

'Whilst I drove it (the corps), there were so many others who helped us achieve what we did."

Karen said one of her main goals for the community was to set people's sights on a clearer

"We helped some locals no longer rely on welfare dependency and I'd like to think we gave many more people a glimmer of hope," she said.

"We also aimed to address the glaring local issue of social isolation, as well as homeless-

"I really enjoyed sharing my knowledge of the Bible with people, most of whom enjoyed it and took it onboard.

'When the summer bushfires struck southern YP a few years ago, we were able to set up a community relief group for those affected."

Karen said having opportunities to share journeys with new people was one of her

"I don't always have all the answers for people, but I loved helping them in some form along their way," she said.

The Salvation Army relies upon community donations for its funding meaning ongoing local support is required.

"Whatever we raised, we put back into the community was always good to support the people who supported us,"

Karen said.

"My role was often tiring but it was just a matter of keeping at it and moving forward as much as possible.

Even as captain, I was always learning — I developed different ways to communicate with the community and learnt how to be a better listener."

Back in 1968, Robert was asked to write football reports for the Stansbury Football Club for local Southern Yorke Peninsula paper, The Pioneer.

He did this for the first season anonymously under the name of Bluey, Stansbury's football colours.

The reports grew to include all SYP teams and then continued after the footy season with "News and Views with Bluey".

He did this for 10 years, moving to the YP Country Times after the closure of The Pioneer.

Many of Bluey's views were his thoughts from the farmgate, as his life has always included sheep breeding and wool production, a passion he inherited from his father.

He also managed to include politics, poetry and fashion.

These articles caught the eye of the Western Australia-based Australian Merino Society Group Breeding Organisation and they approached him to move to Perth to promote the program of group breeding using wool measurements, artificial insemination, and farmer co-operation, with clear communication.

From 1978 to 1984, Bluey set up an office in Perth and travelled throughout Australia, speaking in a vari-

ety of venues including shearing sheds, back paddocks, universities and agricultural colleges.

He made many friends as he travelled including contacts with sheep breeders in New Zealand, South Africa and India — he even received an invitation to a wedding of a government official's daughter in India.

After resuming farming in 1985, Bluey followed another of his passions, preaching.

He became the pastor of the Stansbury Christian Church, before starting the Stansbury Community Church in town, a passion of his father's many years

This led him to preach in our church for many years, conducting many funerals across SYP and 44 weddings in churches, gardens, paddocks, clifftops, beaches, Avers House and Mount Lofty House, gaining respect from those he serves.

Bluey is enjoying semiretirement on the farm at Glenlossie Stansbury still loving his God, his family and his sheep.

'The simulator is a fullscale replica of the fuselage of the Pilatus PC-12 aircraft used by RFDS in SA and NT," a RFDS spokesperson said.

"It has been built principally as for training by

RFDS crews, as well as for building public awareness at major community events.

"Both the cockpit and the cabin are a 1:1 reproduction of the actual aircraft."

While the cockpit is static, the cabin area is live, in that it provides functional oxygen, suction and storage systems, as well as power to operate medical equipment.

The layout of the cabin

area is an exact reproduction of the setting experienced by patients and RFDS staff." the spokesperson said.

"The standard stretcher configuration is two stretchers; we can carry two patients (adult or child), with the added ability to carry a newborn in a humidicrib secured to a stretcher."

year and we are thrilled with the subjects and the quality of the art," a spokesperson said.



He owned a dry cleaning business and was involved in the community through the Moonta Centennial Celebrations, Kernewek Lowender Committee, Coin Club, YP Tourist Development – Moonta Branch, Moonta AH&F Society, Traders Association, Masonic Lodge, Moonta Jubilee Hospital Board, National Trust — Moonta.



Fredrick Gurner JP

Fredrick William Gurner was one of the men responsible for the discussion of the idea for the Kadina Show in the 1870s. He was also a delegate of the Yorke Peninsula copper miners in the strike of 1874. Mr Gurner also held office as the mayor of

Captain Henry William Hancock

Henry William Hancock (1836-1919) was the mining superintendent of Moonta Mining Company, later general manager of the amalgamated Wallaroo and Moonta Mining and Smelting Company. He was a great influencer and builder of Australia's Little Cornwall, with a huge impact around the development and formation of the region and its employment at the time.

Eric Oliver

Kadina born, Eric had his fingers in many pies as a well-known local baker and constant community contributor. From a local football career, player, captain, coach to Rotary, Probus, golf and bowls clubs, Eric took every opportunity to make life better by leaving an indelible mark on the Copper Coast community.

Kate Cocks MBE

Kate Cocks was born in 1875 in Moonta to Cornish parents. She worked as a teacher in the area, including Thomas Plains. By the 1900s, she joined the SA Children's Department as a teacher and assistant matron. Kate was sworn in as SA's first policewoman in 1915, later establishing the Brighton Girls' Home. In 1935, she was awarded the MBE.



"After each event my coach would have my postworkout shake and food ready to help me recover as

"When I got back to the hotel at night, I had a coach working on my body to try and flush my muscles.

"My manager also handled all logistics so if I needed anything at all he'd get it straight away.

"I had a massive group of friends and supporters cheering for me all weekend which really goes a long

way.
"I really didn't have to worry about anything except competing."

Despite not achieving her desired top-10 finish, Turner said she was proud of her performance.

"A few things came up that shook me a bit, but I have progressed so much from last year so I am excited to get back to work and see what progress I can make in another year," she said.

"I also don't dedicate my whole life to this just to compete; I'm in it to win it and I won't be fully satisfied until I do.

"I don't do things in halves so the goal is always to win or (finish on the) podium."

Now a full-time CrossFit athlete, Turner relies upon sponsorship and prize money.

"Every athlete (at the games) gets paid — obviously the higher you place, the more you get," she said.

"You also get money for event wins which I was lucky enough to get one this year.

Winning an event definitely helped get my name out there, but I always think of myself and want others to think of me as a person first and athlete second.

"I was surprised by the following I have over here (in the United States), but I think it helps that everyone loves Aussies!

Turner said she was in the process of receiving a US residency visa and planned to live in the US full-time.

"My coach and training partner are here so living here makes it a lot easier to train," she said.

"I am now spending some time with friends and am trying to eat and relax so much I get sick of it and want to go back and grind it out again!

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

Willy Serle opened the scoring for the day with a goal for Kadina







Members of the public may notice noise, vibration, flashes and/or smoke during the testing. There is no risk to the public outside of the $\,$ gazetted Defence Practice Areas.

For reasons of public safety, there is a permanent exclusion zone covering land, sea and air around the Port Wakefield Establishment. Specific details on the Port Wakefield Prohibited Area can be obtained from Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No GN 26, 4 July 1990, and is shown on the diagram below. Trespassing in this Area is strictly prohibited and very dangerous due to the presence of unexploded bombs. Any person found within the Prohibited Area or on Defence land will be subject to prosecution.

Specific test and evaluation activities may also require restricting public access to the Port Wakefield Defence Practice Areas over specific periods with these areas articulated in the Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No. GN 40, 7 October 1992, and also identified on the diagram below. This may affect access to the Gulf of St Vincent at Port Wakefield and Port Parham




Weather forecast issued at noon, August 16, 2022



Port Broughton: Both jetty and boat ramp were pretty much deserted first thing Saturday morning as occasional showers and strong winds swept along the coast. King George whiting are in the shallows, Shag Island and off Wood Point. The jetty has been quiet, but expect squid as the water clears.

Wallaroo: KG whiting are south at Bird Reef and in the cork-weed grounds off Long Beach after the strong westerly winds. Tommy Ruff (Australian herring) and squid can be caught from the jetty after dark.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Coopers has whiting to 34cm, as do West Light and Warburto Point. Gar are in the bay and from both jetties.

Point Turton: The Banks has KG

whiting, small school sharks and flathead at times. Corny Point and The Pines have tommies, garfish and squid. The jetty has been quiet, but there are mullet in the high-tide shallows towards Port Rickaby.

Edithburgh/Stansbury: Steady catches of just-legal KG whiting can be made from Coobowie, Port Giles and Troubridge Island, Orontes Bank holds whiting, flathead and snook in the run to the Stansbury lease markers. Both jetties are worth a try for tommies, salmon trout and squid.

Black Point/Ardrossan: KG whiting have come onto the bite in the past week or so but you need to watch their size as many are just under the legal length. Squid, tommies and garfish have been the other main reports, along with mullet in the shallows at several local beaches.

Turner turns heads

Ellie Turner has claimed the title of one of the world's fittest humans after a top-20 finish at the 2022 CrossFit Games.

The 24 year old, who hails from Moonta, finished her second ever games in 18th spot.

The 16th annual games were held in Wisconsin, from Wednesday to Sunday, August 3 to 7.

Turner competed in 15 events, which are aimed to be the ultimate measure of combined fitness, across five gruelling days.

Multiple stages of qualifying includ-

ed a third-place finish for Turner at the Torian Pro in May and seventh at the CrossFit Open in March.

Turner described the CrossFit Games as the centre of her season.

"Training volume is at its highest right before the games because we have to prepare our bodies for around 15 events which could include any movement you can think of," she said.

"Right before the games I was training between six and seven hours per day to try and cover all the bases."

Turner said a new programmer with a new style of events meant the first few days of the games didn't go to

"We started with a long gymnastics

event, which I don't love, before an offroad bike event and another three events that day," she said.

"The next day was also similar in the sense every workout involved some form of gymnastics.

"Saturday (day four) was when I started making my move — we had a pool and ski workout and then a wallball and dumbbell squat snatch workout, which I actually won overall.

"My strengths are anything long and gruelling, grunt work and leg endurance.

"So, when everyone started getting tired and sore was when I started coming alive!"
