COMMUNITY consultation is now open on the draft Yorke Peninsula Coastal Access Strategy 2025-2035, with members of the public invited to share their feedback via a survey.

Led by the Northern and Yorke Landscape Board, the strategy has been developed with the Department for Environment and Water; the

Barunga West, Copper Coast and Yorke Peninsula councils; Yorke Peninsula Tourism; Narungga organisations; local stakeholders and community members.

Consultation sessions have already been held with local landholders and progress associations, 4WD representatives and the tourism sector.

The strategy is a response to the increasingly negative impact of off-road vehicle access and unmanaged camping.

Groups in favour of the strategy say use of four-wheel drives, quad bikes and trail bikes and unmanaged camping is resulting in cliff and dune erosion (to the point of exposing Narungga burial sites), littering and pollution, harm to native vegetation and animals, and unsociable and unsafe behaviour.

The strategy aims to balance responsible and sustainable access to the coast with the protection of the natural environment and cultural heritage by providing direction to responsible bodies.

The strategy's suggestions include consolidating and maintaining access tracks with clear signage and infrastructure such as fences and bollards, including on the Walk the Yorke trail, to prevent vehicle access.

Identifying opportunities for offbeach camping, and considering camping restrictions or closures; protecting birds with seasonal access

restrictions; restricting access to dunes; and revegetating dunes and cliffs, are also discussed.

The strategy also proposes auditing toilets, bins, picnic tables and boat ramps and creating an improvement plan in line with demand.

The need to raise awareness and educate locals and visitors to build respect and increase responsible and safe coastal visitation is also a key topic.

# **Voting record**

FOLLOWING months of advertising, the Independent for Grey group has finally found a candidate and announced Anita Kuss will represent it at the federal election, and that is fine — in a democracy voters need choices.

The expectations of the Teals by these billionaires in return for their very generous support are unclear but, while the Teals claim to be independent in Canberra, they behave like a political party and mostly vote as a block.

Last election, Teal candidates stood only in Liberal-held seats and positioned themselves as "Liberal light".

Collectively, they represent some of the wealthiest electorates in Australia and, when it comes to the floor of the Parliament, Teals vote more often with the Greens than any other party, supporting these radical extremists on substantial bills between 73 and 81 per cent of the time since 2022.

The past three years have seen the Greens adopt an increasingly radical agenda well beyond their previous environmental domain and on so many issues. Teal support raises serious questions.

Why Grey's independent candidate would be any different to the rest of the group in backing the Greens needs to be explained and, given the voting pattern, raises the question as to who she would support in a hung parliament.

As a parent of one of the 14 boys who was a victim of paedophile former teacher Thomas Ackland, many might expect me to be disappointed that your story made front page of your newspaper; however, I thank you for publishing the story.

Once again, this ripped the bandaid on what has been a really sad five years to us as a family unit, having to endure the grooming and abuse of our son by this monster, the countless court appearances, listening to the impact statements in court, the judge's sentencing remarks, which were of a graphic nature, and now the appeal. All we hoped is to put this behind us.

Publishing the story highlights the risks that our children could be growing up in.

We all teach our children about the risk of stranger danger; however, the real risk could be actually from the people that we trust.

It could be a teacher, a relative, a friend, a sports coach or a church minster, in fact any adult in their life. The best lesson that any parent could learn from our experience that we endured is to encourage your child to talk to you, with no subject being taboo.

Teach them that their body is theirs, say no, and do not send images via social media that could later be used against them.

We know of numerous other boys who did not come forward or whose story was not heard. Thomas Ackland's sentence was for you too.

We hope and pray that you too take solace that his sentence and lost appeal provides you some comfort and enables you to move forward to be the best version of you.

I also hope that the sentence is a stark reminder to anyone who is remotely thinking of doing the wrong thing. Please get help and support.

# **Background to** mozzie war

IT was my email to your reporter Michelle Daw that prompted the article "Mozzie war heats up" in YPCT's February 11 edition.

I would like to add that it is fantastic that the Barunga West Council and SA Health announced increased mosquito control in our area, thank you.

We have been away for a few weeks, but on recent return have noticed a significant reduction in mosquitoes, and some discussions with people around the town have indicated that the mosquito levels have drastically reduced.

Some background to this article, I lodged a complaint with BWC on January 5, and received a quick response on January 7, advising that due to previous extensive investigations done by BWC in 2016 and 2020, there would be nothing further done due to it being "extremely cost prohibitive for council" and was advised to "ensure you are covered up, use repellent and mosquito coils when outside, while limiting the available breeding areas on your own property".

So, after this unsatisfactory result, I contacted Narungga MP Fraser Ellis and then the YPCT on January 29 and had an interview with Michelle on January 31. To provide a balanced article, Michelle also contacted BWC, SA Health and Fraser Ellis prior to publication.

It is interesting to note that, on February 5, BWC chief executive Paul Simpson announced a visit from SA Health and subsequent enhanced control measures.

It has astounded me that a report some five years old was being used as a treatment guide. I applaud whoever had the random thought that things might have changed in five years and engaged with SA Health now.

My concern now, is why did I have to spend \$350 on mosquito repellents and medical treatments and contact the YPCT to get BWC's attention and subsequent action?

# The fight isn't over

THE opening of the Minlaton Family Centre was a huge cause for celebration in 2024, but the fight for child care in our region is far from over.

Our federal electorate of Grey was last year found to have the worst childcare accessibility in the country, and is often described as a "childcare desert", with three times as many children under 5 as there are child care spots available.

Yorketown Area School is helping southern Yorke Peninsula one step further, having launched an out-of-school hours care service yesterday, which will service up to five schools (see page 3).

One YAS parent described the OSHC as a game changer for the whole town.

That comment encapsulates why child care is such a burning topic: it doesn't only support the parents of young children.

It has a monumental effect on the broader local ecosystem — parents can work, businesses can expand, grandparents can volunteer, and kids can socialise.

Child care is also key to attracting a younger demographic and skilled workers to our region.

Barunga West Council is advocating for these benefits for their communities too, with the Regional Childcare Desert Advocacy Project to launch at Port Broughton on March 4 (see page 3).

Candidates for Grey in the upcoming federal election have been invited to the event and members of the public are strongly encouraged to take advantage of the opportunity to tell them and other leaders their stories.

There are also several State Government grants related to child care now open, with one specific to organisations looking to develop innovative solutions in regional locations (see page 12).

And Uni Hub Spencer Gulf is also now offering childcare qualifications via Central Queensland University (see YPCT 4-2-25).

Congratulations to everybody who has had a hand in improving childcare accessibility on YP and continues to advocate for more services.

Your efforts do not go unnoticed.

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

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# More childcare options for SYP

YORKETOWN Area School has officially launched its out-of-school-hours care program, which will service up to five southern Yorke Peninsula schools.

It will service two schools for before and after school care (Yorketown Area School and St Columba's Memorial School), plus three others for vacation care (Warooka Primary School, Stansbury Primary School and Minlaton District School).

The centre ran its first sessions yesterday, Monday, February 24.

YAS parent Anna Elridge, who has one school-age child and one kindergarten age, said families in Yorketown and surrounding communities were excited.

"It's a gamechanger for our

whole town," she said.

"At the moment, we're struggling to get spots for our kids in the rural care.

"We currently only hold two nights a week."

Ms Elridge said the OSHC could allow parents to work full days up to five days a week.

"I work three days a week and at the moment we're heavily relying on family," she said.

"It's been a long time coming."
YAS OSHC director Kristy
Evans said the OSHC would benefit the school and the rural care
service, which is held at Yorketown
Community Children's Centre.

"The hard part is, for rural care to have the after-school care, some of the younger children have to leave by a certain time so the schoolchildren can have their spot in the afternoon," she said.

"Hopefully now that some of those children are moving into the OSHC space, it means that rural care's children can stay

longer for those working families. "It will provide a service that is actually more suitable and age appropriate and developmentally appropriate.

"Other than rural care, there is no actual school-aged care down the southern end of the peninsula, so this is going to cater for a huge area of people."

YAS principal Michael Beelitz said it had been a two-year journey to open the OSHC.

"Child care has been an identified and long-standing issue on SYP, and we as a school saw a way that we could provide a valuable service to the community and families," he said.

"It will have a positive impact on our ability to both retain and attract staff to our region and school.

"Natalie Beelitz, our business manager, has been relentless in ensuring we are able to open the service, volunteering numerous hours of work and going above and beyond her role in the school.

"This service would not be available without her dedication."

# Childcare advocacy launch

A LAUNCH will be held at Port Broughton next week to focus national attention on the lack of childcare in regional areas.

Barunga West Council will host the launch of the Regional Childcare Desert Advocacy Project, an initiative aimed at addressing the critical shortage of childcare services in the north and west of South Australia.

It will be held at the Port Broughton foreshore from 6pm to 7.30pm next Tuesday, March 4.

The initiative, spearheaded by a coalition of 23 regional councils and supported by national advocacy organisations, including The Parenthood and Thrive by Five, seeks to secure policy changes and funding commitments to improve childcare services.

South Australia's Grey electorate has been identified by the Mitchell Institute as having the worst childcare accessibility in the country.

"The 2022 Demand Survey for Barunga West revealed almost three-quarters of surveyed parents indicated they would either enter the workforce or increase their work hours if suitable childcare services were available," a council statement said.

"The lack of childcare options has also deterred families from relocating to Port Broughton, impacting local economic growth and workforce availability.

"Despite the 2023 Royal Commission into Early Childhood Education and Care recommending enhanced investment in childcare infrastructure, regional areas such as Port Broughton remain woefully under-served.

"While the State Government has advocated for the Federal Government to adopt a better funding model, no definitive action has been taken to support these communities in the immediate term."

The launch will enable attendees to engage with local leaders about challenges and potential solutions surrounding child-care access, with invitations extended to political candidates contesting the Grey electorate in the upcoming federal election.

BWC interim chief executive Paul Simpson said he encouraged community participation to demonstrate the widespread demand for enhanced childcare services.

"The lack of child care is not just a social concern — it has significant economic repercussions," Mr Simpson said.

"Without accessible child care, workforce participation declines, and regional development is stifled.

"This launch event is a crucial step in amplifying our community's needs and advocating for meaningful government intervention"





# Young people outsmarting social media bans

WITH less than a year until the nation-wide age ban on social media is enforced, a new report shows young people are easily bypassing current age restric-

A mandatory minimum age of 16 for accounts on certain social media platforms will take effect by December.

Data from Australia's online safety regulator shows young people aged 8 to 15 years on many of the most popular platforms, such as Snapchat, YouTube, TikTok and Instagram, are only being asked to selfdeclare their age at the point of sign-up.

eSafety Commissioner Julie Inman Grant said this first-of-its-kind report demonstrated there was significant work to be done by platforms that only relied on young people to give their correct age, before the ban kicked in.

"Few have any real stringent measures in place to determine age accurately at the point of sign-up, so there's nothing stopping a 14-year-old for instance entering a false age or date of birth and setting up an unrestricted adult account that doesn't carry those extra safety features," Ms Inman Grant said.

"And this likely means the platforms are unaware of the true numbers of users identified as children and teens on their

"Some platforms also make it very difficult to report under-aged users who are on their platforms today.

"As a result, the reported numbers of monthly active users by services under the age of 18 likely underestimate the true numbers."

According to self-reporting, Snapchat has 440,00 early teen users, Instagram has 350,000, YouTube 325,000 and Tiktok

However, Ms Inman Grant said this was likely an underestimation of the true numbers, as the report found 95 per cent of teens aged 13 to 15 years used eight different social media platforms.

'We'll be consulting with industry and other stakeholders this year about what reasonable steps platforms should be expected to take to give effect to the minimum age requirements, and this report will be one key input to that process,"

"This report shows that there will be a tremendous amount of work to be done between now and December."

# Guns, cash stolen in violent Yorketown home invasion

TWO men have been arrested after firearms and a large amount of cash were stolen from a Yorketown home.

About 1am on Monday, February 24, police were called to a home on St Vincent Highway after three men allegedly broke into the property and assaulted the occupant.

The suspects also stole the victim's Toyota sedan which police later located at Minlaton.

The victim, a 74-year-old man, sustained injuries to his head and was treated at the local hospital.

At about 8.45am the same day, New South Wales Police patrols stopped a white Hyundai van on the Barrier Highway near Broken Hill.

A passenger from the van ran off from police, while the driver, a 49-year-old man, was arrested.

Police searched the van and located 14 firearms, a further loaded semi-automatic shotgun, a large quantity of collectable coins and a large amount of cash.

Inquiries revealed the items hadallegedly been stolen during the aggravated break-in at the Yorketown

The 49-year-old NSW man was

charged with knowingly dealing with proceeds of a crime, receiving property stolen outside NSW, possessing a loaded firearm in a public place and not keeping a firearm safely.

He was refused police bail and will appear in Broken Hill Court today, Tuesday, February 25.

Following further inquiries, at about 3pm on Monday, NSW patrols stopped a white van on the outskirts of Cobar, which police suspected had been travelling with the first van.

Police searched the van and located further items allegedly stolen during the Yorketown break-in.

A 35-year-old man was arrested and charged with knowingly dealing with proceeds of crime and receiving property stolen outside of NSW.

He was refused police bail to appear in Cobar Local Court also today. South Australia Police will apply for the extradition of the two men at their court appearance.

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# Fed up with road vandalism

A TICKERA resident says he is fed up with damage to road signs, burnouts and illegal drag racing on the roads leading into the town.

The resident, who did not wish to be named, supplied the YP Country Times with photos he had taken on Saturday, February 8, of damage he believes was inflicted the night before at the intersection of Snodgrass and Wallaroo Plain roads, south of Tickera.

"Since then, my blood has been boiling," he said.

"Someone had taken out all those signs in one go.

The intersection has been resurfaced and the smooth surface has become a perfect place to do burnouts."

"We get sick of seeing it (the damage)

"The road to Kadina was terrible for years and we finally got a good road and the very next thing, there are burnouts after burnouts, which start potholes, because they melt the bitumen."

The resident also said illegal drag racing was known to take place on a strip that had been marked out with start and finish lines in blue paint, 400 metres apart, on Snodgrass Road, north of the intersection with Spencer Highway.

A spokesperson for South Australia Police said the Yorke and Mid North Local Service Area was not aware of the

# **Life-saving** changes to vehicle safety

SOON all new vehicles sold in Australia will need to be equipped with standard car-to-car autonomous emergency

From March 1, Australian Design Rule 98/00 — Advanced Emergency Braking for Passenger Vehicles and Light Goods Vehicles legislation will be enforced, and several models from popular car brands will be discontinued.

Dr Angelo D'Elia from the Monash University Accident Research Centre said the change had the potential to save lives and significantly reduce road

"Data shows that equipping vehicles with AEB significantly reduces crash risk and injuries, particularly for novice drivers," Dr D'Elia said.

"The most impactful time for improving safety is when a vehicle first enters the fleet, as the safety features installed at this stage have the greatest long-term effect.

"Ensuring vehicles are fitted with advanced vehicle safety technologies, such as AEB, can protect both vehicle occupants and vulnerable road users.

"Mandating such technologies can speed up their integration into the vehicle fleet, leading to significant savings in road trauma and related social costs."

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# Tell your stories of near misses

IF you have had a near miss at a notorious intersection on the outskirts of Moonta, Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis would like to hear about it.

He is compiling reports from motorists about the safety risks of the Thrington Road-Mines Road intersection to present to the Department of Infrastructure and Transport, as part of a push for it to be upgraded.

upgraded.

"We can take those close calls back to the State Government and say, 'Well, there might not have been any crashes but there have been this many near misses or close calls and, because of that, let's get in before a crash and prevent one from happening rather than responding to one," Mr Ellis said.

Mr Ellis said Copper Coast Council and the Country Fire Service Northern Yorke Peninsula Group had also raised concerns.

"Unfortunately, despite the obvious popularity and traffic that goes through this intersection, we have not been successful in convincing the State Government of the need for an upgrade.

"They have replied to my pleas and said that, as a result of there not being available crash data which shows reported crashes in the immediate past, there is no precedence being given to having an upgraded intersection.

"It is an increasingly busy intersection with an explosion in popularity of housing in Moonta, Moonta Bay and Port Hughes, and it is the main turn-off to Adelaide for those coming up to enjoy the holiday homes.

"You only have to look at the number of new homes that are going up in Moonta Bay and Port Hughes to know that this major intersection is flawed.

"It needs a turning lane and it needs increased infrastructure to accommodate the higher traffic flow."



SPEAKING at the monthly Yorke Peninsula Council meeting on February 12, Northern and Yorke Landscape Board general manager Tony Fox said the majority of community and stakeholders were on board with the strategy.

"We're committed to listening to what people want and not restricting access to coast by applying it," he said.

"It's not stating specific actions, it actually just provides a framework for decision making to help prioritise how

you look at each different component of your coast, and make some decisions about how you manage access there.

"Some of the suggestions that might come out of that is reducing four-wheel drive camping on beaches.

"We're hoping to look at places where people are accessing beaches across dune systems, so multiple tracks entering the same beach, rationalising those and maintaining a really good access track to the beaches.


"So not restricting people's ability to go to beaches and have a bit of fun, take the four-wheel drives and eskies down there and the beach cricket and have fun — but to do it in a way that gets people off the sand dunes.

"Sand dunes are critically important and we've got to stop impacting on them because they're getting degraded rapidly."

# Cape Elizabeth 'single biggest driving force'

DAMAGE at Cape Elizabeth was the single biggest driving force behind a proposed coastal access strategy for Yorke Peninsula, Northern and Yorke Landscape Board general manager Tony Fox says.

Mr Fox was present at Yorke Peninsula Council's monthly meeting on February 12.

Councillor Roger Johns had earlier told Mr Fox he was concerned about the environmental degradation occurring at his regular swimming spot at Cape Elizabeth, south of Moonta.

"My observation is that area is continuing to be absolutely trashed," Cr Johns said.

"There's new tracks, sand dunes being split in two, veg-

etation destroyed, a beautiful area for birdlife which has been impacted on — can you give me some assurance that you're able to be involved or guide or

provide some support for these problems?"

Mr Fox said the Department for Environment and Water managed the Crown section PHOTO: Farrin Miller via NYLB

of Cape Elizabeth, and it had installed cameras and signage, and handed out expiation notices


"The landscape board doesn't actually manage any coastline; we don't have any authority under the Crown Lands Act," he said.

"What we're looking for from the strategy is a united front from councils, Narungga Nations, Point Pearce Aboriginal Corporation, Aboriginal Lands Trust, the department and the board to really drive some change in that space.

"We really want to make a difference there.

"Specifically, that's the area we want to stop access to the dunes by four-wheel drives.

"We believe that is an essential pillar of this whole strategy."

# Marna Bangarra to expand

MORE native species could be repopulated in Dhilba-Guuranda Innes National Park, following the success of the yalgi program (yalgi is Narungga for bettong).

These could include numbats, bilbies, quolls and southern brown bandicoots, Northern and Yorke Landscape Board general manager Tony Fox said, speaking at a Yorke Peninsula Council meeting on February 12.

It would be an extension of NYLB's Marna Bangarra project, which is returning locally extinct species to Yorke Peninsula.

"We've got current funding at \$1.76 million from the Federal Government for the next few years to continue this work; it's been ongoing for five years," he said.

"We have got a suite of really amazing new animal species that we're hoping to reintroduce into the landscape, on the back of the yalgi releases.

"They are breeding there, so we've got third generation animals.

"This is massive because it actually provides an example of how you can have a biodiverse landscape in these productive landscapes, just by doing some really good things like managing foxes and cats.

"The concept of having this biodiverse hotspot down here is a massive opportunity for a resource that can be leveraged for tourism and become a unique part of Australia.

"We're very proud of this project and the board's committed to 20 years at least of funding for this."

The events and projects that we support have a clear link to water use and our vision of delivering trusted water services for a sustainable and healthy South Australia. Funding will be provided in the 2025/2026 financial year.

NEWLY announced Independent candidate for Grey, Anita Kuss, says ensuring the electorate has local training and education to improve skill shortages and develop its own workforce will be one of her top priorities.

Ms Kuss has stepped away from her role as chief executive of Uni Hub Spencer Gulf to focus on her campaign, but she will be bringing her history in the education sector with her.

"Being able to compete in a national market for employees is becoming harder and harder," she said.

"We all know in this region that you can try and recruit people in from the city, and some of them stay but a lot don't."

Ms Kuss said helping build a local workforce could include providing better support for entry-level roles, and localising learning.

One of the issues was that training for many trades could not be done in the region, she said.

"It's a compounding impact in a lot of ways — employers aren't going to take on apprentices because there's a whole lot of other costs and issues around lack of training."

Ms Kuss said she was also concerned about health, saying Medicare needed to work better for communities that were unable to access GPs in a timely way, or at all, let alone specialist services.

"We do need to make sure we have high-quality and fit-for-purpose health, education and recreational facilities that will help improve that liveability and encourage more people to live and work

Ms Kuss also mentioned child care, transport infrastructure and social services as issues for the region but said her overarching philosophy was to ensure the community voice was front and centre.

"Rather than bringing in big services from outside to tell us what's good for us, there's a whole lot of local solutions that we know work in this region, and the communities have built themselves," she said.

"It comes back to how are we investing in and leveraging what already works."

She said one of the electorate's strengths was that people "love where they live" and valued their connection to community and the natural environment.

'Everywhere we've gone, people have said there's opportunities for growth in so many different ways, but they are fearful that those opportunities get hijacked or done to us and it might not be aligned to the values of the community."

Ms Kuss's campaign has received financial support from Climate 200 and the Regional Voices Fund, which describe themselves as crowdfunding initiatives.

However, the Federal Government has earlier this month passed donation caps, which will limit single candidates to an \$800,000 campaign spend and parties to \$90 million. These caps will not take effect until after this year's election.

"It's disappointing that the two major parties are really trying to throw their weight around to undermine the whole grassroots, community-led movement that is backing independents," Ms Kuss said.

"As soon as that legislation went through, Climate 200 and the Regional Voices Fund received so many donations, with people going 'this is this is wrong'.

"I think that was a really encouraging sign that community are not going to take that lying down and that they will continue to back independents."

The date of the federal election has not yet been announced but must be held on or before May 17.

MUCH-needed repairs have been completed to the acclaimed artwork on a silo at Bute.

Artist Adam Poole-Mottishaw and his assistant, Shane Cook, repaired sections including the face, hair and hands of the young girl depicted on February 18 and 19.

The repairs were paid for by Barunga West Council, after representations were made by the Bute 2000 Onwards Progress Committee.

# **Telco complaints** surge at 3G close

A SHARP increase in consumer complaints and unresolved complaints has alerted Australia's peak communications consumer body.

In late 2024, complaints to the Telecommunications Industry Ombudsman went up 13 per cent and mobile service complaints increased 23.4 per cent, compared to the previous quarter.

Some of the biggest issues for Yorke Peninsula, such as no service and dropouts, had a massive hike of 44.1 per cent and 21.1 per cent in the same quarter.

The Australian Communications Consumer Action Network chief executive Carol Bennett said this data from the TIO was a disappointing failure.

"Consumers rely on their mobile and internet services for work, education, connection with loved ones and even basic safety," Ms Bennett said.

"The increasing volume

of complaints, particularly around service dropouts and lack of connectivity, shows that Australians are not receiving the reliable services they have paid for and need."

Ms Bennett said there was a huge spike surrounding the 3G shutdown, and it was time for telcos to restore Australia's confidence in the sector.

The data showed complaints peaked during the 3G shutdown in November, and small businesses were heavily impacted with complaints of no service increasing by 53.9 per cent, and poor coverage rising by 34.4 per cent.

"Telcos must be held accountable for improving complaint resolution processes, and we need stronger regulation in the sector to protect consumers and ensure that all Australians have access to reliable and affordable communications services," Ms Bennett

# Help keep riding lessons on track

VOLUNTEERS with a range of skills are being sought to support a planned boost to the number of classes being offered by Riding for the Disabled in Kadina.

More volunteers are needed to serve in various roles, such as gardening and fundraising, in addition to those with horse-handling skills for tasks including assisting during riding lessons and feeding the horses when they return to live at the Kadina centre on Port Road.

The centre is currently offering fortnightly Friday morning lessons during school terms, with horses transported from RDA in Port Pirie.

Child and adult participants take lessons in riding and horse care, led by a coach from the state branch of the RDA.

RDA Yorke Peninsula member Carol Hopkins said local members are being trained as coaches and, once they were qualified, the branch hope to offer weekly classes and bring horses back to live at the Kadina centre.

The YP branch was in danger of closing down due to a lack of volunteers after the Covid-19 pandemic and its horses were sent to other RDA centres.

After a period in recess, the team secured a \$10,000 Federal Government grant in mid-2024 via non-profit organisation the Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal to support the re-establishment of the group.

Carol said she has seen the many ways that disabled children and adults can benefit from learning to ride and spending time with



horses in her five years as an RDA volunteer.

'They are socially engaging with people outside of their regular sphere and there is a decision-making process when they are on the back of a horse," Carol said.

"Our riding lessons include games to introduce an element of fun and so the riders can learn skills such as recognition of colours and numbers.

"They also improve their gross motor skills and core strength and the fine motor skills they need to steer a horse.

"They are interacting with the horse, spending time learning how to feed it, groom it and lead the horse, so the children learn a lot about themselves."

Carol said it was very rewarding to see the clients develop a relationship with the horse they rode each lesson and their enthusiasm for taking part in the

She said one of the many memorable clients at the centre was a 12-vear-old non-verbal and autistic girl who was distressed about her first lesson because it was a change from her normal routine.

"We managed to get her on the horse and after a few lessons she said her first word," Carol said.

The RDA has an Our Horse Sponsorship Program for businesses and community organisations to help support looking after a horse for \$250 a month, which goes towards essential costs such as feed and vet care.

# Huge increase in penalties for animal cruelty

PEOPLE caught abusing, neglecting or mistreating animals will face tough new penalties after new animal welfare laws were passed in State Parliament last week.

Those found guilty of animal cruelty now face maximum fines of up to \$250,000, and/or 10 years in jail, for the aggravated ill-treatment of an animal, up from \$50,000 and/or four years in jail.

A corporation can now be fined up to \$1 million for mistreating animals, the most severe penalty in the nation.

The Animal Welfare Act, which had not been updated since 2008, now includes a proactive duty of care provision requiring pet owners to provide animals with a minimum level of care, such as adequate food and water.

It also allows authorities to address

neglect before an animal is harmed.

This means RSPCA SA can talk to owners about better looking after their animals without having to wait for the animal to be harmed and having to lay cruelty charges

The changes coincide with a significant increase in State Government funding for the RSPCA South Australia, most of which will go toward helping the organisation enforce the state's new animal welfare

The 2024-25 State Budget provided an extra \$16.4 million over four years for RSPCA SA to deliver animal welfare compliance activities in accordance with the new Act.

The definition of an animal has also been broadened to include fish, bringing South Australia into line

with the rest of the nation. The inclusion of fish aims to address cruel practices such as harvesting shark fins and stingray tails.

Recreational and commercial fishing activities will not be affected by the new laws and remain under the control of the Fisheries Management

Climate, Environment and Water Minister Susan Close said the reforms created an Animal Welfare Fund to capture licence fees, fines and penalties that could be put back into supporting and promoting animal welfare.

It also included mandatory reporting of suspected animal welfare offences within the greyhound racing industry and improving regulation and oversight of animal research.

More than 1000 people provided feedback on the proposed changes to the Act during community consultation last year.

'These reforms mean people who willfully mistreat animals will face serious consequences, in line with community expectations," Minister

"The new penalties provide a strong deterrent and will play an important role in reducing incidents of animal cruelty in South Australia.

"Surveys and public consultation on the Bill show South Australians have little tolerance for animal cruelty and they want strong deterrents.

"I was really pleased to see the reforms receive such strong support from the community via the public consultation process.

RSPCA SA chief executive Marcus Gehrig said the organisation was grateful to see strong community feedback on the draft Bill reflected in legislation.

"We look forward to positive changes for animals with the Act being passed," he said.

"RSPCA SA is the main organisation empowered to enforce this Act, and equipping our inspectorate with legislation that has no loopholes and gives inspectors greater powers to prevent animals suffering harm is positive not only for animals but for our whole community.

"We are especially grateful that under the changes, our inspectors will be empowered to address neglect before harm occurs. This is critical to us being able to deliver on our mission of prevention of cruelty."

# **Calling local** dental staff and truckies

LOCAL dental staff and truck drivers are being called on to volunteer to help bring a free dental service to Yorke Peninsula and reach as many people as possible.

Australia's largest dental charity — Australian Dental Foundation — is heading to Maitland, Kadina and Wallaroo in school terms one and two and is calling for volunteer help while it is in the region.

ADF chair Dr Greg Miller said the foundation was asking dental professionals - dentists, oral health therapists, dental assistants — if they could volunteer some time to help it reach students, aged care residents and disability patients at the three locations.

"We know many of our country centres are doing it tough at the moment with uncertainty in several industries and intense dry conditions, so we are heading in to do our bit," Dr Miller said.

"And statistically, oral health is worse in the regions and access to dentists is reduced compared to Adelaide."

ADF will bring its mobile clinics on trailers to YP to provide free dental checkups and treatments to school students, then use the clinics as a base to visit aged care facilities and conduct clinics at Novita hubs for children and adults.

Dr Miller said ADF also needed to find local truck drivers to help move its trailers between schools.

"Volunteers are important to us and allow us to do so much more," he said.

"Last year almost 30 per cent of the work we did was free of charge at schools and charities.

"We could not do that without volun-

ADF is Australia's largest not-for-profit dental charity, providing dental services to at-risk cohorts and vulnerable populations across all states and territories.

In its 10 years of operation, it has provided more than \$20 million of dentistry to more than 110,000 people.

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# Standing up for students

RHYS Heinrich is the only South Australian student to be accepted to the Australian Council for Student Voice advisory board in 2025, and plans to use the opportunity to advocate for better civics education.

Rhys, who is head prefect of Central Yorke School, Maitland, joins 15 other board members across the country, who will raise student voices and contribute to change in the education system.

"All the other members are on the east coast in Queensland, New South Wales and Victoria, so I'm the only student from South Australia, Northern Territory and Western Australia," he said.

"It's a privilege but it also puts pressure on you, because you know you can't represent every student."

Rhys said he hoped to use his position to advocate for improving young people's understanding of civics.

"Having a general understanding of politics in the way that we can contribute to society, whether that be participating in youth groups, youth parliament (is important)," he said.

"If we don't have students involved, are we going to have a functioning society?

Only four in 10 year 6 students, and 28 per cent of year 10 students meet the proficiency standard in civics and citizenship, a national report by the Australian Curriculum Assessment and Reporting Authority revealed last week.

The State Government last

year announced an \$18.4 million investment into civics education, with reforms including having a specialised civics teacher in every public school, in the hope of increasing the number of students studying the year 12 subject, Politics, Power and People.

Civics is currently delivered through Humanities and Social Sciences as a compulsory aspect of learning between years 3 and 8; however, the quality of this delivery is mixed due to a lack of specialist teachers.

Education Minister Blair Boyer said years 7 and 8 HASS teachers were undergoing training to specialise in civics, and years 9 and 10 non-HASS teachers were learning how to bring civics into their specialist subject areas, including science, maths, arts and English.

Once the training is complete, the new civics curriculum will be rolled out from

Rhys said CYS did not offer HASS beyond year 10, let alone year 12 Politics, Power and People.

"În semester two, I'll be going to Maitland Lutheran School for history, because we don't have enough students interested to run it at our school."

He said showing students how civics was applicable to their passions or interests might influence their engagement.

"The teacher could delegate to the student, say if I'm interested in getting a trade, there's a benefit scheme for tradies right now, (they could look at ) how that will benefit them and how they can use that to their advantage," he said.

"It's probably one of the more important life lessons, understanding why we have laws in place, and why it's important to share your voice, how you can benefit not just your life but so many oth-

# School attendance improving in South Australia

ond-highest attendance rate for full-time secondary students in the nation, according to the Productivity Commission's annual report on government services.

Last year the attendance rate for students in years 7 to 10 at public schools was 84.3 per cent, just behind the Australia Capital Territory, and above the national average of 83.4 per cent.

"South Australian public schools have shown attendance improvement for the third year in a row, following the establishment of a specialist team to address the challenges of student absences," Education Minister Blair Boyer said.

"This team includes additional

SOUTH Australia has the sec- senior social workers to address colleges and almost \$50 million for authority. complex cases of non-attendance, an attendance outreach team working across schools to track and follow-up students with absences, and a team working in 10 primary schools as part of a pilot to see the impact of having a staff member on site focused on attendance.

"The data also shows that SA had the second-highest apparent retention rate from year 10 to year 12 nationally for full-time students, and for full-time Aboriginal students.

"However, the government is concerned by the ongoing national decline in apparent retention rates, which is why giving students options to stay engaged in school and learning, such as five new technical

students at risk of disengaging in school, is more important than ever."

SA also has the second-highest proportion of early childhood education and care services exceeding the National Quality Standard in the

More than a third of SA services received a rating of exceeding, above the Australian average of 22 per cent.

The State Government said it had invested an additional \$7 million into the Education Standards Board to increase and improve regulatory services, which had gave a 63 per cent increase on the previous year in the number of service visits.

SA is the only state or territory with an independent regulatory

The State Government has also launched three grant programs aimed at building the workforce and infrastructure needed for 3-year-old preschool.

The Flying Start Infrastructure Grants program will invest \$40m over four years to support the not-for-profit sector to deliver new or expanded facilities in areas with projected unmet demand for pre-

There are also grants available of up to \$100,000 for organisations to develop innovative solutions in regional, rural and hard-to-staff locations — for example, developing a shared educator or teacher model where staff can be shared across

multiple sites or increasing retention through professional development and further training.

The third grant is to support the creation or expansion of networks among the early childhood workforce, aiming to better address childhood developmental vulnerability by connecting early childhood, allied health and community service professionals at the local level.

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# Walk through history

WHILE Moonta Mines is getting all the glory, local history volunteer Ken Rudd is encouraging interest in where mining on the Copper Coast started, at Wallaroo Mines.

Mr Rudd raised \$21,000 for a fenced walkway into the Wallaroo Mines, which is otherwise inaccessible.

At the bend where Lipson Avenue becomes Newland Road, visitors can walk about 150 metres into the site, where Mr Rudd said they can see remnants of Harvey's Pump House, some mine shafts, and a cairn with a plaque commemorating where James Boor discovered copper ore in December 1859.

Mr Rudd said the walkway was prompted by the tentative World Heritage listing of Moonta Mines, where visitors can walk around much more freely than at Wallaroo Mines.

"There's going to be a lot more emphasis on the area, and Wallaroo Mines is the place that it all started," he said.

"It's the beginning of what happened over the next 63 years, and also the beginning of the town (Kadina).

"The fact that there was no natural water in the area, and low rainfall, (meant) there probably wouldn't have been settlement here if not for the

Mr Rudd thanked Paul Turrell and

the team at Boundary Line Fencing for erecting the walkway, as well as the Kadina Apex Club, National Trust of South Australia Kadina branch, Northern Yorke Peninsula Rotary Club and Kadina Lions Club for their donations towards the walkway.

A Copper Coast Council community grant also helped the project come

"The protection of Cornish mining heritage is extremely important to council," corporate and community services director Katrina Borlace said.

"Our heritage deserves to be celebrated, and it is important to support projects like this one that help connect the community to its past.

# Garage trail saves on landfill

MORE than 4000 items were sold and almost 2000 items saved from landfill, thanks to Yorke Peninsula Council's 2024 Garage Sale Trail.

Held over two massive weekends in November, 903 YP residents got involved across 48 garage sales and stalls in the YPC area.

Mayor Darren Braund said it was incredible to see how the peninsula embraced this event, demonstrating the region's community spirit and commitment to sustainability.

"The Garage Sale Trail is about more than just recycling goods; it's about building connections and strengthening our local community," Mayor Braund said.

The event gave everyone a bit more cash in their pockets, and raised almost \$25,000 for local households, groups

However, there were social benefits too, with 78 per cent of participants reporting the event made them feel more connected to their local community.

Additionally, 87 per cent of sellers said they met new people in their community who they did not know before the event.

Across the country, there were more than 6000 garage sales, estimated to have saved 2.5 million kilograms of

# SA bans nicotine pouches

SOUTH Australia has become the first state to ban nicotine pouches, strengthening its crackdown on illicit tobacco and vaping products.

From February 4, nicotine pouches became subject to the same controls as illegal tobacco and e-cigarettes.

The new laws also allow the government to ban future nicotine products that may emerge.

Health and Wellbeing Minister Chris Picton said the government was taking preventive action to stop the next dangerous nicotine trend.

He said nicotine pouches were now prohibited, with fines of up to \$1.5 million for those selling them.

Nicotine pouches, marketed as an alternative to smoking and vaping, contain nicotine, sweeteners and flavouring.

Designed to be tucked under the lip, they deliver nicotine directly into the bloodstream, often at levels equivalent to a cigarette.

Packaged in bright colours and novelty flavours, they are frequently promoted online, particularly to young people. The ban is part of broader efforts to combat the illicit

tobacco and vape market. Since July 2023, more than \$12 million worth of illegal

products has been seized in the state. The Australian Medical Association South Australia

welcomed the move, warning of the unknown risks associated with nicotine pouches. AMA SA president Dr John Williams said nicotine pouches were unregulated, meaning nicotine levels and

ingredients were unclear. A recent survey of 1600 people aged 16 to 39 found 25 per cent had used nicotine pouches, with 19 per cent using

them in the past month. Dr Williams said rising use among young people was concerning and likened nicotine pouches to vaping, call-

ing them the next major health battle. For help quitting smoking or vaping, contact a health professional or call Quitline on 13 78 48 (13QUIT).

# More quiet time at Woolworths

QUIET Hour at Woolworths, Kadina, been extended to five days a week to reduce anxiety and sensory stress for customers with specific needs.

Woolworths director of stores Jeanette Fenske said Quiet Hour would be held between between 10.30am and 11.30am, Monday to Friday.

During this time, participating stores lower lights, turn down music or the radio, and turn off beep sounds at registers and oven buzzers for an hour.

All public address announcements are stopped, except in case of emergencies, roll cages removed from the shop floor and store entry ways cleared.

"Quiet hour was developed in consultation with disability service provider Life Without Barriers and launched in 2019 one day a week to meet the need in the community for a low-sensory shopping experience.

"Since then, the initiative has rolled out to over 900 stores across Australia, providing customers with a less stressful shopping experience and increasing their independence.

"We continue to receive positive feedback from customers on the initiative, and our teams take great pride in ensuring the stores are quieter and less stressful for customers during this time.

"Quiet Hour is now an integral part of how we aim to assist independence in our stores, in addition to the opportunity provided by Direct to Boot and delivery options for many customers.

Ms Fenske said the expansion of Quiet Hour to five days a week had been trialled over busy shopping periods such as Christmas.

The expansion was welcomed by Life Without Barriers chief executive Claire Robbs.

"Life Without Barriers has been delighted with Woolworths leadership to give people more options to do their shopping in store and increase their independence in an environment that is not stressful and overwhelming to them," she said.

# More than a memorial

THE return of a memorial field gun to Victoria Square, Kadina, has signalled the completion of the refurbishment of war memorials in the park.

The Howitzer was craned back into the square on February 18 after being repainted.

The gun and associated plaques were the final elements to be restored in a program of works funded by a \$5367 Saluting Their Service Commemorative Grant from the Australian Government.

The Kadina War Memorial and brass World War I plaques were also restored.

The project was initiated by the Kadina RSL sub-branch and work began in August.

Sub-branch president Les Mayard said he was pleased it had been completed in plenty of time for Anzac Day.

He also thanked Copper Coast Council and community engagement coordinator Holly Cowan for their support to secure the grant through the Department of Veteran Affairs.

Each of the monuments has historical importance and helps to promote appreciation and understanding of those who served," Ms Cowan said.

"The restored gun and plaques look fantastic."

The gun is more than a memorial for Mr Maynard, who has vivid memories of the Howitzers protecting him and fellow infantry soldiers when they were fighting in the jungles of Vietnam.

He served in the war between late 1968 and late 1969, starting out in a machine gun team with Charlie Company of the Ninth Battalion.

"If we got into trouble, we would call on the gunners to fly projectiles (from the Howitzer) over us to ensure our protection," he said.

"Once we got caught up in a bunker system in Bien Hoa province late one day, it was almost dark.

"The artillery fired all through the night, with no more than five minutes between shells, to suppress the enemy."

The memorial gun is dedicated to all who served in WWII, Korea and Vietnam and was unveiled in 2001 by former Kadina RSL president Don Richardson.

It is a 105mm Pack Howitzer, which was used by the Australian Army in the Vietnam War and in the Konfrontasi on the island of Borneo and the Malay Peninsula from 1963 to 1966 when Australian where troops were involved as part of a Commonwealth force.

It was designed as a lightweight field gun that could be broken down into components so it could be transported by air or pack.

Similar guns were used by the Australian 105 Field Battery in support of the infantry at the battle of Long Tan in Vietnam, for which they and the Australian patrol of Delta Company of the Sixth Royal Australian Regiment both received citations from the United States and Vietnam governments.

"You can't be what you can't see," she said.



# **Aussies falling** into debt trap

NEW research from The Salvation Army shows that 46 per cent of Australians started 2025 in debt, with many relying on buy now, pay later services to cover household essentials.

The study also revealed that 3.2 million Australians do not understand how interest works, and almost one in three are unable to create a personal budget.

The Salvation Army's Moneycare head, Kristen Hartnett, said the findings highlighted the financial strain many Australians were facing, with rising living costs pushing people into debt.

She said a particularly concerning trend was the increasing reliance on BNPL services, which had overtaken credit cards as the most common form of debt among community members.

Many people were using these services to pay for essentials such as groceries and pharmaceuticals, often without recognising them as a form

Ms Hartnett warned that, while BNPL products may seem convenient, they could quickly lead to a cycle of debt due to accumulating fees.


The Salvation Army's Moneycare service offers free and confidential financial counselling, along with online tools and resources to help Australians manage their money.

Ms Hartnett said in the past financial year, 27 per cent of people who reached out to Moneycare were employed, showing that financial stress affected people across different income levels.

She encouraged Australians to seek help early, emphasising that financial hardship was nothing to be ashamed of and support was available.

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# Moonta street sign icons update

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# Klau shines on netball court

This week, we continue the series focusing on the top 25 sporting icons to come out of Yorke Peninsula so far in the 21st century, as chosen by YP Country Times sportswriter Peter Argent.

Like Olympic basketballer Steph Talbot (Kadina), Commonwealth netballer Sarah Klau Games (Yorketown) is still at the height of her game.

Standing at 190cm (6'3"), 30-yearold Klau is a tall, athletic defender, equally adept in goal defence and goal

She was first selected in the Australian Diamonds squad for the 2018-19 international season and has been a consistent representative since.

Klau has played in the past two World Cups, winning a silver medal in Liverpool in 2019 before claiming gold in Cape Town in 2023.

In between, she was also part of Australia's gold-medal-winning team at the 2022 Commonwealth Games in Birmingham.

Klau began her national league career with the Adelaide Thunderbirds in 2016 before moving to the New South Wales Swifts in 2018 for the inaugural season of Suncorp Super Netball.

She impressed in her debut match in round 1 and quickly became a key part of the Swifts' defensive circle, also occasionally playing wing defence.

A career highlight was winning two SSN premierships with the Swifts in 2019 and 2021.

In 2019, she formed part of the defensive circle with fellow South Australian Maddie Turner. The Swifts finished second in the minor round but lost to the Sunshine Coast Lightning in the second semifinal by 10 goals.

They then defeated the Melbourne Vixens to earn a grand final rematch, where they dominated the Lightning with a 17-goal victory, sparking wild

In 2021, the Swifts again finished second, narrowly behind the Giants. They won the major semifinal by a single goal before defeating the Giants in the grand final by four goals, this time with home-court advantage.

Klau was first spotted at a coaching clinic in Yorketown as a 13-year-old by prominent coach Scott Waddington.

She spent her first summer with the Adelaide Cougars, coached by Scott's daughter, former Thunderbirds midcourter Leigh Waddington.

At 14, Klau played State League reserves with the Cougars. The Cougars won back-to-back reserves titles during that era.

She was vice-captain of South Australia's under 19 team that won the national title in 2014 and was also part of the ANL Southern Force championship-winning team that same year.

Klau later moved to Matrics with Scott Waddington and played in a one-goal overtime loss in the 2014 Netball SA grand final.

She started her netball career with the Southern Eagles in the YP Netball Association before moving to Adelaide to attend Immanuel College on a music scholarship, playing the

She is now a qualified occupational therapist.




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# Yorke Peninsula football's

# TEAM OF THE CENTURY

Front bar and clubroom discussions often turn to the best players to come out of different clubs and districts.

Footy on Yorke Peninsula has a rich history, providing a wealth of talent to choose from when selecting the best team of the past century, 1925 to 2025.

My team of the past century is skippered by a state captain from 1980, Port Victoria's AFL Hall of Famer Rick Davies.

Another player from that club, Ron Kneebone, won the 1966 Magarey Medal at age 29 during a 201-game career with Norwood and takes the key defensive position.

Among a host of premiership players are North Adelaide's Maurice "Charlie" Arbon (1949) and Yorketown's Alan Aldenhoven (1952), tri-club SANFL player Neil Craig (1975-78 / Sandilands), Norwood's diminutive wingman Doug Olds (Maitland) and Jack Oatey (1946, 1948, 1950 / Maitland) — the latter having won a Yorke Valley Mail Medal in 1939 — and Sturt's Trevor Sims (Port Broughton/Redhill) and Davies (1974, 1976).

Jamie Tape (Coobowie/Edithburgh) was part of Woodville-West Torrens' first SANFL premiership in 1993.

Reg Hausler (1938-39) from Yorketown had to travel west to enjoy success, winning two premierships with Claremont in the WAFL.

Tough-as-nails half-back Tony Giles (Yorketown) was a member of two flag winning teams at Alberton (1979, 1981) and a regular SANFL state representative.

After a 124-game AFL career, Scott McMahon (Minlaton) returned to the SANFL and played in back-to-back premierships with Sturt in 2016 and 2017.

Emergencies Jarrad Redden (WWT 2011, 2020, 2021 / Stansbury) and North Adelaide's David Marsh (1972 / Ardrossan) also enjoyed SANFL premiership success.

Bernie Vince (Stansbury) played 200 AFL games and won two club best and fairest awards with Adelaide and Melbourne, while Davies claimed seven club champion titles with Sturt. Both Davies and Kadina's Ross Sawley won SANFL leading goal-kicker awards

First ruck Sam Jacobs (Ardrossan) finished with a 200-game AFL career at Carlton, Adelaide and GWS Giants.

Defenders Sims and West Torrens' Lee Robson from Edithburgh both played more than 200 SANFL league games, while Davies and Craig are members of the SANFL

George Hewett (Broughton-Mundoora) has now played 179 AFL games for Sydney and Carlton, while Richard Champion (Kadina) played 183 games with the Brisbane Bears and later the Lions after four seasons with Woodville in the 1980s.

Jack Giles (Yorketown) captained both the Sturt football and cricket clubs. Hedley Freundt (Curramulka) finished in the top three of the 1956 Magarey Medal count when Dave Boyd won but missed the final games of the season.


This team has been selected as if to play a game and, naturally, 10-time SANFL premiership coach Jack Oatey would lead as mentor, with Neil Craig — who also coached at AFL level — as his assistant.

Footballers unlucky to miss selection include Hayden Skipworth, Peter Tilbrook, Matthew Goldsworthy and Norwood's 1946 premiership player and 1948 leading goalkicker Graham Farrow.

And players such as Bob Proud, Harold "Dribbler" Hawke — who remarkably won the 1937 Magarey Medal despite travelling from Curramulka to play — James Moss and the mercurial Vince Copley, despite having a significant impact on YP football, were not considered for selection as they arrived as "blow-ins"



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# Roads leads to Barossa

In a recruiting coup, the Kapunda Bombers have secured the services of former Ardrossan Kangaroos footballer Sam Roads.

Roads, who played SANFL football for Woodville-West Torrens and Port Adelaide, has spent the past two years with the Broadview Tigers in the Adelaide Footy League's division I competition.

He returned to Ardrossan in 2021 and 2022 under the guidance of Sam Jacobs.

Roads first played A grade with his home club, Ardrossan, in 2012, before venturing to Adelaide.

Kapunda football director Matthew Ryan said Roads would add muchneeded experience to the club's young group.

The Bombers had a strong number of emerging talents, including several stepping up from underage teams, and Roads would play a key role in lending experience to the squad, Ryan said.

Ryan said the team had shown promising signs at the end of the 2024 season.

The inclusion of Roads and Logan Collins from Broadview, both with div I amateur league experience, would assist the club's growth, Ryan

In the COVID-affected 2020 season, Roads played for Riverton Saddleworth Marrabel United (RSMU) in the North Eastern Football League.

Kapunda has a strong connection with Yorke Peninsula sportspeople, with the Farley and Jolly families contributing to the Bombers in both football and netball.

With the recruitment of the Broadview pair, the return of former player Wyatt Ryan, and the natural progression of young talent, Kapunda is aiming to climb the ladder.

The club last won a Barossa, Light & Gawler premiership in 2005.





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

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# Get ready to 'get the crop in'

THE critical question of how much rain is needed for crop germination will be one of the topics explored at Hart Field-Site Group's annual Getting the Crop In seminar.

The free event will be held in Clare on Wednesday, March 12, and offers the opportunity to hear from industry experts across a range of fields: agronomy to finance, grain markets to chemical regulations.

Among the speakers will be the University of Adelaide's Glenn McDonald, who will give new insights into rainfall and crop emergence.

He will share the results of some of his trials and speak of the effects of prolonged dry conditions on plant germination.

Hart chair and Snowtown farmer Glen Wilkinson said the seminar would give participants a valuable opportunity to catch up with other like-minded farmers, and ask the presenters questions specific to their own farm and sit-

On the back of a dry year, he said the event would provide an excellent chance to reset for the year ahead.

"It's been a tough season and it's really easy to bury your head in the sand about how you and your business are travelling," Mister Wilkinson said.

"The topics we have lined up are as seasonally relevant as they've ever been, with some key take homes that potentially can change how you look at your business moving forward, especially if we're looking at another dry sowing."

Paraquat is a hot topic, and Chris Preston from the University of Adelaide and Craig Davis, of Crop Consulting Services, will provide an update on what is happening globally, potential outcomes of the paraquat review and

alternative herbicide options.

They will also give an update on SAGIT pulse desiccation trials.

A highlight of the Getting the Crop In program is the alwaysanticipated farmer keynote speaker and this year, Victorian farmer Jack Owen will share an insight into his farming operations.

Hear his story of a nextgeneration farmer finding his feet and looking to discover the secrets of farming success, and how that led to writing a book to share what he is learning along the way.

Richie Mould from Market Check will give an overview of the current grain market, the key drivers and outlook going forward.

Hart's outgoing research intern Miffy Purslow will present on novel seed treatment options for fusarium root rot in lentils and the results of a pot experiment at Waite in 2024.

This year's "on the couch" panellists will be accountant Bec Court from Hood Sweeney, broker Deb Purvis of Purvis Agri Finance, and banker Ben Pitt from National Australia Bank.

The group will share their advice to help farm managers maintain solid relationships with their financial partners, and provide some strategies and tools for managing challenging financial

They will also give tips for understanding financials and entering into negotiations, and bust some myths about finance.

## LambEx returns to Adelaide

AUSTRALIA'S biggest sheep industry conference, LambEx, will return to Adelaide next year.

It will be held at the Adelaide Convention Centre from July 8

LambEx was successfully revived after a six-year hiatus with a record 1400 industry participants attending LambEx 2024 at the Adelaide Convention Centre.

Attendees represented the fields of sheep production, processing, retailing, innovation, science, education and government, among others.

Kerry Harris, chair of 28 National, a wholly owned subsidiary of Sheep Producers Australia responsible for the LambEx brand, encouraged sheep producers and others in the industry to save the date.

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# Hay on the way around SA

RURAL Aid is ensuring that hay reaches South Australian farmers in need as efficiently as possible.

It is one of the charitable organisations being supported by Primary Industries and Regions South Australia to deliver hay right as part of a \$18 million drought support package announced in November.

Primary Industries and Regions Minister Clare Scriven said the State Government was proud to support charities such as Rural Aid to help deliver much-needed fodder to SA farmers dealing with some of the driest conditions on record.

"As part of our \$18m drought support package, the State Government allocated \$2m to assist charities with the freight costs of transporting fodder to assist farmers with feeding livestock," she said.

"This has led to hundreds of truckloads of hay reaching primary producers across the state, providing some immediate relief as we navigate these challenging times."

Rural Aid chief executive, Mr John Warlters said the organisation would receive \$125,000 from PIRSA to support hay deliveries within SA.

"Through our collaboration with PIRSA, we can continue to deliver crucial support efficiently, ensuring that those facing the impacts of drought have the assistance required to cope with these tough times," he said.

Since July 2024, Rural Aid has delivered about 1600 bales of hay — about 1000 tonnes — to more than 100 farmers in drought-affected regions



including World's End, Carrieton, Peterborough, Quorn and beyond.

"This ongoing effort is part of a broader commitment to provide meaningful relief and assistance to those facing the harsh realities of drought," Mr Warlters said.

"Our services are designed to provide holistic support to farmers, from immediate practical needs like water and hay to mental health assistance that helps farmers cope with the emotional challenges of drought.

"Our hay deliveries are more than just a service — they're a chance to connect. We share cuppas, catch-ups, and offer support; we're always ready to listen and help."

Mr Warlters said Rural Aid could provide prepaid Visa cards to help ease immediate pressures and enable farmers to access hay and other essential supplies, and provide counselling. "Farmers carry a heavy load and sometimes a conversation is all it takes

to make a difference," he said. "Our counsellors provide a safe space for farmers to talk, share their struggles and find support when it's

needed most. "Through its Community Development Programs, Rural Aid is also working alongside SA communities

to build resilience, with community development activities underway in William Creek, Crystal Brook, Gladstone, Eudunda, and Orroroo because strong farms and strong communities go hand in hand."

# Scouts on alert for crop diseases

IN an Australian first, grain growers can access accurate, localised data to improve disease management through a project harnessing technology to track airborne disease spore movement.

The three-year, \$3.6 million project aims to provide growers and advisers with earlier awareness of the presence of blackleg, botrytis, leaf blights and spots (alternaria species), cereal powdery mildew and general rust in their crops.

The Grains Research and Development Corporation project is led by BioScout with support from research and commercial partners across Australia.

As part of the project, a network of sensors that capture airborne particles containing fungal spores has been installed. When combined with artificial intelligence approaches, the data from these sensors allow for

early alerts of potential crop infection, when spores are microscopic and plants are asymptomatic, providing growers with the opportunity for better informed and timely disease management deci-

GRDC manager agriculture technology Peter Thompson said growers were currently reactive to fungal diseases as detection was only possible once disease was visible in

"Growers are already on the back foot once visual symptoms can be scouted by eye," he

"During early infection, spores are microscopic, and plants are asymptomatic, making disease difficult to detect. But, at the same time, early infection is the optimal stage to apply fungicides.

"This project is providing more accurate and localised disease risk information for growers, so they can make better informed decisions on when and where to apply foliar fungicides, helping maximise profit from fungicide use and delay the onset of resistance."

As part of the project, 60 BioScout SporeScout units have been deployed across Western Australia, South Australia, New South Wales, Victoria and Queensland.

The units use air sampling to trap fungal spores, which are photographed using automated microscopy. An AI function then compares these photos to a database of images to detect and identify fungal disease.

Data from the SporeScout units is displayed on BioScout's online dashboard, with graphs containing the airborne spore concentrations of specific path-

BioScout CEO Lewis Collins said that, over the 2024 season the network sampled nearly a billion litres of air, tracking and reporting on around 1.6 million unseen disease-causing spores in near real-time.

This sampling revealed a staggering 1.2 million spores of general alternaria.

"In another Australian first, we can now monitor and display pathogen movement around the country in near real-time, providing an early warning detection system for many growers," he said.

"For example, in the past month (mid-January to mid-February) waves of general alternaria were seen travelling north to south along the network's east, then back up

The BioScout network is free to grain growers for the next 12 months, and the company encourages feedback during this period for further development. Growers and agronomists can access the network via bioscout.com.au.

## Input prices forecast to go up

FARM expenses are set to increase across 2025, with inputs expected to be slightly higher than last vear.

That's the outlook from Bendigo Bank agricultural analyst Sean Hickey.

However, he said the price of resources used in fertiliser production appears to have stabilised compared to the volatility seen between 2021 and 2023.

Mr Hickey said, because Australia imported more than half its fertiliser supplies, a lower Australian dollar was impacting our buying power as global trade was generally done in US dollars.

"Geopolitical uncertainty remains a factor as global fertiliser exporters including China, the European Union and Russia remain embroiled in various trade issues," he said.

"But an increase in the amount of nitrogen-based fertiliser imported has maintained pretty decent price stability over 2024 and we see nitrogen pricing trending higher over the

next quarter before stabilising later in 2025.

"Phosphate based fertilisers such as MAP and DAP are coming into a high demand period after sluggish demand and seasonal factors saw a price decline at the start of 2025.

"China has halted exports of DAP and MAP fertiliser from December 2024 until April 2025, so we expect both MAP and DAP to sit above the \$1300/t mark through to mid-2025."

Mr Hickey said the International Energy Agency anticipated a slight lift in crude oil demand in 2025.

Labour supply had been a significant challenge for producers, particularly those involved in the horticulture and wool sectors reliant on sourcing significant numbers of workers for a very short period of time.

"While labour supply has certainly improved, we expect sourcing farm workers, with the exception of skilled shearers, to be much easier in 2025," Mr Hickey said.

WHYALLA: After the State Government forced the GFG steelworks into administration, it joined with the Federal Government to provide a \$2.4 billion support package, which included on-ground support, assistance for creditors and infrastructure upgrades. Whyalla currently makes 75 per cent of Australia's structural steel, which is used in railways, schools, hospitals and other infrastructure.

RATE CUT: For the first time in four years, the Reserve Bank of Australia dropped the cash rate, lowering it by 0.25 per cent. The cash rate is the interest rate banks charge each other to borrow money overnight. Mortgage holders are expected to benefit from the drop, but it is currently unknown if other loans and accounts will be better or worse off with the changes.

CORAL BLEACHING: Western Australia's World Heritage listed Ningaloo Reef is experiencing unprecedented bleaching, after a record marine heatwave that has lasted since last winter. Ningaloo's last major bleaching was in 2011.



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
