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# Preselection open for Narungga

THE Liberal Party wants to run a candidate in the seat of Narungga.

Members of the state executive met last night (Monday, January 17) and elected to open nominations for a week, closing Monday, January 24.

Incumbent Narungga MP Fraser Ellis suspended his Liberal Party membership in February 2021 after the Independent Commissioner Against Corruption investigation into the Country Members

Accommodation Allowance.

In October, Mr Ellis wrote to the party asking for their endorsement as candidate for

Mr Ellis has confirmed he will run in the March election as an independent.

"This essentially changes

nothing in the way that I operate as my community's local Member of Parliament," he said.

"I have always put our community first, ahead of the party, which was best exemplified when I crossed the floor to vote against the government on the mining bill."

Mr Ellis, said while he was disappointed with the decision, he welcomed the fact it had now been made.

"I thank the local branch members for their vocal advocacy in wanting me as the Liberal candidate and for the strong local support they have

to provide me," he said.

#### **Animal protection**

BRINGING an animal into the family should be a joyous and loving event, but many animals end up living a nightmare, or even being killed, with cruelty cases rising to appalling levels.

Some of the worst cases seen by the RSPCA have involved dogs being starved or neglected despite serious injuries, a cat drowned in a rubbish bin, and a horse with a large, gaping wound on his chest left untreated.

The rate of animal cruelty in South Australia is shocking, with the RSPCA reporting 4398 cruelty complaints investigated in the year 2020-21, resulting in 29 charges being laid. Unfortunately, a lot more cases probably went unreported.

Animal abusers are cowards.

Because animals cannot report abuse and can do little to fight back, they're often used as "practice" victims by violent people.

Research in psychology and criminology shows people who commit acts of cruelty to animals often go on to commit violent acts against their fellow humans.

A study by Dr John Clarke, a lecturer in psychology at the University of Sydney and consultant to the New South Wales Police Force, demonstrated, using police data, that 61.5 per cent of convicted animal abuse offenders had also committed an assault and 17 per cent were guilty of sexual abuse.

Most disturbingly, animal abuse was a better predictor of sexual assault than previous convictions for homicide, arson, or firearms

Only one per cent of cruelty-to-animals offenders had no other convictions at all.

Cruelty to animals in South Australia carries a penalty of up to \$50,000 or four years' imprisonment. These penalties need to be applied rigorously by the criminal justice system; cruelty to animals must be taken seriously for everyone's sake.

If you suspect someone of abusing an animal, report it to authorities right away, for the safety of the entire community.







I'VE had to reintroduce a limit on my news consumption. Which, I admit, seems odd for a newspaper editor.

In the early days of the pandemic, which seem such a long time ago, I would have a huge sense of dread before each press conference.

Would the numbers be high? Would they be someone I know? What do these changes mean for my community?

Limiting my time on the internet allowed me to still consume the valuable information I needed for my own understanding and my job, but also allow myself space to breathe.

Two years into this new normal, and it feels slightly different.

I find myself searching for opinion piece after opinion piece and reading every expert take and recommendation I can find to try and understand the situation we're in better.

I'm not filled with impending dread anymore. Not all the time.

Instead, it's unease about how various governments have prepared and planned for reopening and the implications it has on those around me.

We're not in a lockdown but I know several people who are living life in a restricted manner because they can't afford to get sick or pass it on to others.

There's the uncertainty around accessibility to vaccines and testing, although our local health staff are doing their absolute bests.

Our frontline workers in supermarkets and service stations are also doing their bit and must be sick of people asking after rapid antigen tests when they also have no stock.

Parents, teachers and school staff preparing for term 1 and all the challenges it presents as well, with some children learning from home and others in a classroom for now.

There are many layers here too — what happens if the students are in a mixed class?

I know the local schools are working to get information out to families as quickly as they can, as they're only figuring it out.

I'm not an expert in health, or government planning, but I feel for everyone affected by these curve balls that seem to keep coming.

THE state government has announced its hybrid return to schools for students.

Students, teachers and parents will juggle at least two weeks of mixed face-to-face and online learning as part of the plan.

Schools will reopen for children of essential workers and those who are vulnerable on Monday, January 31.

Preschool, reception and years 1, 7, 8 and 12 students will be returning to classrooms two days later, Wednesday, February 2.

All other students will learn from home for two weeks with the aim to return all students to the classroom by Monday, February 14.

For the first time, it has been strongly recommended students as young as year 3 wear masks while attending school. Classes will also continue if a teacher or student is a close contact.

Premier Steven Marshall said a plan was devised in full knowledge there would be disruptions to the start of the school year.

"While we understand there will be disruptions to the start of 2022 and it's going to be challenging for a lot of families, we have put our kids first with this schools plan they learn better face to face and that is what we've worked hard to achieve," he said.

"What we're doing here is trying to get the balance right."

#### **Local concerns**

Kadina parents Krystle and Rhyder Atkinson fear their youngest child, Lochi, who is starting reception, won't want to go without sisters Savanna 10, and Taleigha, 8.

"He's been incredibly excited about going to school because while he was in kindergarten, and his big sisters were both in school, they couldn't go and see him," Mr Atkinson said.

"He's been so excited to have those moments with them, and now they can't even do that for two weeks."

Mrs Atkinson questioned why school holidays weren't extended for two weeks.

"Those first two weeks in reception are incredibly important because that's when you make friends and you get an understanding of how school is going to work, so we don't want him missing out," she said.

Minlaton District School principal Ali Bogle said the priority would be providing time and support for teachers to develop materials and ensuring the school community was well informed.

"Our leadership staff will be meeting this coming Wednesday to prepare for the return of staff the following week," Ms Bogle said.

"Putting in place contingency for the impact of Covid cases within our school and community will also form a major part of our planning agenda."

#### **Grants for GPs** and pharmacies for Covid vaccination

MORE vaccines will be administered into the arms of South Australians with extra funding available for GPs and pharmacies.

South Australian primary care providers will have the opportunity to apply for the additional funding to increase their capacity to deliver more vaccines across the state.

Premier Steven Marshall said more than 600 primary care providers, including General Practices and pharmacies authorised by Commonwealth Government to administer Covid-19 vaccinations are invited to apply for the-

"This extra funding boost is designed to ensure selected GPs, pharmacies and health services have the capacity to increase vaccination uptake in both metropolitan and regional areas over the next crucial few weeks," Mr Marshall

"These first-time grants will enable primary care providers to extend opening hours, recruit additional immunisers and support staff, expand existing inreach services, as well as to further promote and advertise vaccination opportunities within the local community, particularly to high-risk groups."



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# Supply disruptions reaching our shelves

SURGING cases of Covid-19 are driving the transport industry to a halt.

The effects are trickling down into supply chains causing headaches for many retailers — in particular the bigger chains including Woolworths and Drakes.

Drakes general manager Bob Soang said, at any given time, 25 per cent of what they ordered from suppliers was unavailable due to various reasons.

"At present, we do have some issues with short supply from our meat and poultry suppliers as they are experiencing serious Covid issues and this has resulted in lower than usual stock," Mr Soang said.

"There is also a shortage in chicken so consumers are buying other types of meat which then also has an impact, not to mention extra demand and panic buying.

"As people buy more, we are ordering more, but this does then put the supplier under pressure which impacts the entire

"Fortunately, at this stage, the impact in our Copper Coast stores is quite minimal with only a few out of stocks; however, this could increase dependent upon the continued impact of Covid."

Kadina Gourmet Meats owner Rhys O'Donohue said his Kadina and Moonta stores had more than enough supply.

"We source our meat from local farmers so we aren't relying on so many people down a supply chain to get stock into our stores," Mr O'Donohue said.

"So if we are to see an impact it will

only be very minimal.

"If anything, we have been more in demand, people are sourcing their meat from us which is really great to see.

"It really is the perfect chance to support local, local people and local businesses."

#### SA not as bad as other states

In an email to customers, Woolworths CEO Brad Banducci said customers would have noticed gaps on the shelves, including in Kadina.

"Unlike the surge buying of early 2020, this is because of the number of people in our supply chain in isolation — from suppliers to truck drivers and distribution centre team members — which in turn is causing material delays to store deliveries," Mr Banducci said.

"We are experiencing Covid-driven absences of 20 per cent-plus in our distribution centres and more than 10 per cent

"We understand how frustrating it is when you can't find the product you're looking for and, together with our suppliers and supply chain partners, we're working hard to get all products back on the shelf as quickly as we can (including rapid antigen tests).

"In the meantime, we have more than enough stock in the system and plenty more coming.

"We would of course also ask you to keep shopping as you normally would and to continue to show kindness to our teams.

"There is no quick fix to the issue and customers are likely to see patchy shelves for a number of weeks."

# **RAT race begins**

CHANGES to Covid-19 testing has kicked off around the state.

Health authorities have moved towards rapid antigen tests as an alternative to the PCR tests.

South Australians who are deemed a close contact of a positive Covid case will now be able to receive two free RAT kits from SA Health — if there is a collection point near them.

Currently there are no collection points on Yorke Peninsula.

Copper Coast Council is supporting a call by Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis for a location somewhere within the electorate.

"With 241 Covid-19 cases on the Copper Coast and 468 cases within the Yorke Peninsula region, our local community needs easily accessible tests to help reduce the spread and protect our health," a council spokesperson said.

"With the nearest collection sites at either Port Augusta or Adelaide, a site on the Copper Coast is central and serviceable to many nearby regional resi-

pared with their metro counterparts."

Close contacts must register online at the SA Health website and will be then sent a receipt to collect testing packs.

Premier Steven Marshall said using RATs for close contacts was the next step to tackling the Omicron outbreak.

"Offering two free RATs for people who are considered close contacts will allow us to increase the number of tests taken so we can get a clearer picture of how many Covid positive people are in the community," he said.

"I ask all South Australians to work with us as we make this pivot in our testing regime, it's a big change so it will take some time to get used to.

"If you don't have immediate access to a RAT test and you are a close contact, or of course have symptoms, please continue to use the more than 80 PCR testing sites we have across the state."

There are currently more than 580 active cases across Yorke Peninsula, Copper Coast, Barunga West and Wakefield Regional Council areas.

#### Peak to be less significant

Updated Omicron modelling completed by Professor Joshua Ross at the University of Adelaide has shown increased public health measures reduced Covid case numbers.

Projected modelling in South Australia remains slightly uncertain and depends heavily on the behaviour of South Australians during the coming week; however, the model predicts SA will hit the peak of this current wave between January 15 and January 25.

During that period, peak cases are projected to be between 6000 and 10,000 per day.

The model does suggest the state may never see cases that high and we could be in the peak period right now.

At the peak, it is predicted SA will have around 370 hospital admissions and 50 in ICU, well below the recent '500 Bed Plan' announced by the government to ensure our hospitals are not overrun.

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# Funding gushes in for stormwater projects

COPPER Coast Council has been flooded with funding.

The state Stormwater Management Authority has given council \$513,600 to help with the Moonta Road, Moonta Bay, and George Street, Moonta, flood mitigation projects.

About 1.1 kilometres of new drain will be constructed along Moonta Road between East Terrace and Marine Parade to improve the level of flood protection to local residents.

George Street will receive 500 metres of new stormwater drain from Queen Square through to Ellen Street.

"We are very appreciative of the state government funding which will help facilitate both of these projects," Mayor Roslyn Talbot said.

"Flooding in George Street between Ellen and Henry Streets has been a problem for many years.

"Underground storm water will alleviate this problem and it is a project that is long overdue."

Member for Narungga Fraser Ellis said it was wonderful to see further investment into local infrastructure which will improve the com-

#### Call to recall state parliament

MEMBER for Narungga Fraser Ellis has supported a request to recall the South Australian Parliament to deal with ongoing Covid-19 pandemic.

The House of Assembly adjourned in late December and will not resume until after the state election on March 19.

The formal request, to recall parliament from February 8-10, was submitted to Premier Steven Marshall by parliamentary speaker Dan Cregan with the support of Labor and crossbench MPs.

"When parliament rose for the year, it appeared that we had Covid under control but with the onset of Omicron and subsequent alarming rises in case numbers and hospitalisations, our health services and community and business secare now under great duress and all of SA's leaders must rise to the challenges being faced," Mr Ellis said.

"I take my responsibility as a state MP representing the Narungga electorate very seriously and believe it is necessary to recall parliament in order for me to appropriately take the concerns of my community to the decision-makers for full accountability.

"A litany of questions that should have answers irrespective of whether a new variant emerged or not are daily raised with me and it is greatly concerning that getting answers for my community has been unacceptably difficult without direct briefings, resulting widespread confusion and dis-

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#### Licence crackdown on drug drivers



STEP FORWARD... Minister for Road Safety Vincent Tarzia said a new law, which allows police to issue an instant loss of licence to drug drivers, will boost the safety of South Australian roads.

DANGEROUS drivers can now be instantly stripped of their licence following a positive roadside drug test result.

The Australian-first legislation is set to boost road safety after being passed by the state government late last year.

Minister for Road Safety Vincent Tarzia said the bill was intended to prevent further South Australian lives being lost.

"Drug drivers have no place on our roads and this bill has shut down a dangerous loophole that afforded irresponsible motorists with opportunities to continue driving despite positive drug tests," Mr Tarzia said.

"We make no apologies for this crackdown on selfish drivers who put innocent lives at risk."

About 15 per cent of lives lost on South Australian roads were attributed to drug driving last year.

SA-BEST MLC Connie Bonaros said the

new law will save innocent lives.

"It is obvious from SAPOL road statistics current drug driving laws serve as little deterrent to motorists who choose to drive while under the influence of drugs," Ms Bonaros said.

"I hope these tough new laws go a long way to addressing that disturbing trend innocent lives are depending on it."

Previously, a driver who returned a positive roadside drug screening test was not issued an instant loss of licence, but instead an oral fluid sample was collected and provided to Forensic Science SA for spectrometry analysis.

If the analysis returned positive, the driver would be advised of their threemonth licence disqualification.

Therefore, there was a 28-day delay before a loss of licence was enforced, leaving drug drivers free to endanger

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# **Human impact** affects penguin activity, habitats

FLINDERS University ecologists have encouraged Troubridge Island tourists to be wary of and not interfere with — the habitats of the little penguin, found on the island.

A recent study of 43 penguins across four different locations in South Australia revealed an increased level of human disturbance can lead to increasingly abnormal and aggressive behaviour.

The research was conducted with eight penguins on Granite Island, 20 at Troubridge Island and 15 across locations at Penneshaw and Emu Bay on Kangaroo Island.

"The little penguins in our study were more aggressive and bolder on Granite Island, which has the greatest levels of unregulated human disturbance," assessment leader Dr Diane Colombelli-Négrel said.

"The aggressiveness did not vary with sex, nest type or breeding stage, indeed, contrary to our prediction, we found no difference in aggressiveness between males and females.

"We demonstrated aggressiveness during nest defence is repeatable in little penguins and may represent a consistent behavioural trait in this species."

On Troubridge Island, penguins were the largest in size on average but were also the shyest, confirming animals living near urban environments face many pressures linked to human disturbance.

Former Troubridge Island of 26 years, Chris Johnson said, in his eyes, disturbance of such nature hasn't been too large of an issue.

"In all the time I was there, I don't think I saw too many signs of human disturbance to the penguins at all," he said.

'You'll only ever touch a penguin once, and that's because you'll get bitten, and if you don't you're extremely lucky."

Troubridge Island is about 15 minutes away from the mainland and attracts hundreds of visitors a year.

"They're (all birds) the backbone of the island because we see about 800-1200 (penguin) nests a year," Mr Johnson said.

"All walks of life come across and the main attraction is the eco-side of the island."

Mr Johnson said South Australian Research and Development Institute had long been active on the island, learning more about the habitat and animals present.


'They've done a lot of work, microchipping a lot of penguins and getting an understanding of what they get up to, how many there are, how far they go," he said.

'We've learnt a lot from that research."

#### Tough start to 2022

I SYMPATHISE with all who have been impacted by the ongoing pandemic, whether you have contracted the virus, had to isolate as a close contact, lost work because of a shut down, are trying to run a business impacted by workforce shortages and restrictions, are a very busy and tired health worker or have had difficulties accessing a test or vaccine.

Cases are now being reported throughout every council area in the state — our local government areas included — and it has been a tough start to the year for so many.

I also appreciate the complications for parents, students, and school staff any disruptions to the start of the school year will bring.

A staggered start was deemed the best approach by decision makers to keeping the virus at bay and I am pleased that the plan is to have all students back into the classroom for face-to-face learning by February 14.

At time of writing, I await details of student vaccinations, testing and strategies to deal with inevitable cases in schools, and can only advise to stay tuned.

I can report that I have supported a call for Parliament to sit in February for appropriate (and vital) oversight of the management of the ongoing crisis by all MPs to occur.

In some good news, the Narungga electorate has done well in the past three weeks with grant funding allocations which I am very pleased

First came the announcement on December 23 two local councils, Barunga West and Yorke Peninsula, will receive a combined total of \$569,757.44 from the \$1.709 million latest round of the Recreational Fishing, Boating and Camping Facilities Grant Fund.

That's an estimated third of the total fund for our patch — \$200,000 for a new pontoon-based jetty at Port Broughton; \$29,770 for an upgrade of the Point Turton groyne and \$139,987.44 for new camp toilet facilities at various locations on Yorke Peninsula.

On January 5, the Regional Coastal Protection Grants were announced and Narungga electorate was allocated \$388,000 of the allocated \$1.2m in the latest round, all for local projects that address erosion risks and are vital to protect our precious coastlines.

Successful projects include \$55,000 to design defence structures, \$20,000 to review hazards at Foul Bay, \$208,000 for Moonta Bay foreshore rock armouring, \$30,000 for protection works at Port Broughton and \$75,000 for fencing at Thompson Beach.

Then recipients of 2021-22 Office for Recreation, Sport and Racing Infrastructure grants funding were announced on January 9, with five clubs successful: \$50,000 to assist construct a clubhouse for the Sporting Shooters Association of Australia (Moonta) Inc.; \$26,000 to upgrade irrigation at Maitland golf course; and funding to resurface multi-use courts at Alford Tennis Club (\$21,900), Bute Sporting Club (\$56,000), and Port Broughton Combined Sporting Club (\$38,800).

Congratulations to all involved in these deserving projects, and for all you do in improving and maintaining facilities in rural townships.

# **Memorials with meaning**

Copper Coast Suicide Prevention Network has installed the first four Cor Infinitus memorial stones in South Australia.

A stone has been placed at the RSL SA Wallaroo sub-branch, Vietnam Veterans Association of Australia Copper Coast subbranch, as well as Kadina Memorial and Moonta Area Schools, acknowledging families who have lost a serviceperson through suicide.

The stones also aim to promote conversation about mental health among the entire community.

Cor Infinitus, Latin for infinite courage, is a national initiative created by Kevin Humphreys in Queensland and dedicated to all those who served our nation and were overwhelmed by the battle within.

SOS Copper Coast deputy chairperson Peter Sims was pleased to drive the project locally.

Upon approval, SOS Copper Coast was able to secure enough local donations to fund the project.

Goerecke Memorials, Moonta, was contracted to install the four 90-kilogram granite stones.

One side of the stones features a reminder to those going through a bad time and having suicidal thoughts that they will leave behind parents, partner, children, mates and survivors, while the other side has emergency contact numbers.

Mr Sims said the memorials were a reminder to both current and former servicepeople, as well as the wider community, support is always

"Years ago, it was frowned upon to talk about suicide, but it's important to know people suffering from mental health issues are not on their own," Mr Sims said.

"As difficult as this may be, reach out to available support, talk with family and friends who will journey with you."

Vietnam Veterans Association of Australia Copper Coast sub-branch president Rob Nankivell said he was happy with the new stone, residing just inside the Moonta clubrooms' garden.

"I'm very pleased and proud of the initiative," Mr Nankivell said.

"I encourage people to come and check it out - hopefully this makes people more aware of the (mental health) issue."

Wallaroo RSL sub-branch president Glen Boyce said the stone had come up beautifully in the branch's front garden.

"It will make for great opportunities for people to reflect and I welcome anyone to come and check it out," he said.

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# FOGO Australia wide by 2023

THE federal government has committed to all households in Australia having a Food Organic Green Organic bin

Copper Coast Council is ahead of the trend, implementing its FOGO collection system last year, while nearly 50 per cent of regions across the state are also on board.

A council spokesperson said, whilst council provided waste management to residents, the specifics of waste management and services was in compliance with state and federal government strategies.

"Green Industries SA is responsible for the development of a waste strategy that council must comply with when establishing and maintaining a kerbside waste collection and other waste management services to residents and businesses within the Copper Coast," the spokesperson said.

"Council is on track to meet federal waste diversion rates by next year with further education and community assistance."

In the first six months July-December 2021-22 in the Copper Coast, kerbside waste service has collected:

- 1010 tons of organic waste (compared to 293 ton in 2020-21)
- 627 tons of recycling (compared to 435 ton in 2020-21)
- **1036 tons of general waste** (compared 1582 ton in 2020-21)
- This equals 363 tons of additional waste collected (compared in 2020-21)
- Diverting on average 61.2 per cent of kerbside waste from landfill (compared to 31.5 per cent in 2020-21)

#### Know before you throw

Did you know plastic bags can't be recycled in the yellow-lidded bin?

Soft plastics such as shopping and produce bags and large plastic packaging must not be placed in the kerbside collection recycling bin.

The plastic can get jammed at the processing plant, it can't be separated from other lightweight materials and products inside the bags can't be

If plastic bags are found in the yellow-lidded bin, the plastic bag and all of its contents would be sent to landfill so the bin will not be collected by the garbage contractor.

Soft plastic bags should be deposited in a REDcycle bin located at participating supermarkets — including Kadina Woolworths and Drakes stores.



# Water safety a family affair

IF you've learned to swim at Wallaroo during the past 60 years, there's a chance a member of the McIntosh family has been involved.

Ann and brother Rodger began teaching in the early 1960s.

Since then, three generations of McIntoshs have been involved in water safety education.

At this summer's VACSWIM program, Ann was joined by granddaughters Constance, Fenella and Arabella.

For Ann, it was a passion sparked by both a love for the Wallaroo Swimming Club and for teaching kids.

"It's always been rewarding teaching children to swim, because you pick up a love of seeing them achieve and maybe conquer a fear they had," she said.

"I had a little girl come up to me last week to say thank you and she added, 'my grandma told me you taught her to swim, and I thought oh God, well yes, I probably did.

"It was sweet, but also made me think."

When Ann was a student participating in swimming lessons at Wallaroo, between 500 and 600 kids from all around would come.

"We were always a strong club at Wallaroo," she said.

"And that's why we enjoyed coming, plus the fact it was a great place to meet people and there were always great teachers."

She remembers the time they had to draw on the kindness of local fishermen, after an unfortunate accident on the jetty.

"There was a huge hole in the middle of the jetty at the time which meant you couldn't get

from land out to the end where our platform was," she said.

'So in order to get out there, we had to load everyone into a dinghy some local fishermen let us use."

No one has drawn on her wisdom quite like her granddaughter Constance, who was this year's instructor in charge of VACSWIM

Constance said the connection the family had built with the program was "pretty special".

"I don't think many sites can say they've had a family (involved) for

quite that long," she said.

"I think it's just great to see the site flourish but also having such great instructors come through has been really great to see.

"I was looking for something to do in my holidays while at university, and I also just have a passion for young ones."

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
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

"The website also offers keepsake items, memorial items, resource books and even a custom-made Forever Young Healing candle."



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

"I just finished a book for National Novel Writing Month, where you have the month of November to write the first draft of a 50,000 word novel.


"I managed to get 95,000 words done and Black Hare Press has already asked to look at it, despite it not being edited, so that's a positive.

# Returning to school in 2022

SCHOOL will be back in 2022, albeit a little differently for many students across the peninsula.

The term was initially expected to start on January 31 but has been bumped back to minimise the Covid-19 impact.

Teachers and school staff will use January 31 and February 1 as additional planning days to get ready with students in preschool, reception and years 1, 7, 8 and 12 back in class on Wednesday, February 2.

Other year levels will begin learning from home from Wednesday, February 2 and will be back in the classroom on Monday, February 14.

Children of essential workers and vulnerable students will be able to return to school from January 31.

#### Supporting children

The changes and uncertainty caused by Covid-19 can be challenging for some children, especially around school closures and restrictions.

Some children will return to school having experienced some level of stress, anxiety, isolation and grief while some may have experienced increased violence at home.

UNICEF has created a list of ways teachers can support children in the transition back to learning.

"In addition to continuing to use the different skills teachers have been using to ensure their students' learning and emotional wellbeing while schools were closed, the following suggestions might be helpful when schools reopen," a spokesperson said.

"It is essential to listen to students' concerns and demonstrate understanding as well as empathy.

"Offer your students the opportunity to have a one-to-one conversation with you to reconnect and discuss any concerns that might have arisen when their school was closed.

"Before teaching new academic content to students, teachers and school personnel should take time to check how children are doing.

"Remember children may have difficulty concentrating at first or may need more time to get back into the routine of

"Provide opportunities for children to take breaks, move around, and reconnect with their friends and peers."

Provide accurate and age-appropriate information about Covid-19 but be sure to remind students of the precautions and plans put in place to prevent the spread.

"Engage children in making the classroom a welcoming, safe and comfortable space," the spokesperson said.

"Children can provide suggestions; help decorate the walls of the classroom with colourful and welcoming messages and work in small groups so they can support each other to catch up on learn-

"Let them know that being supportive of each other will help them get through this together.

"Teaching can be an extremely stressful profession, particularly now, so make sure to protect your own physical and mental health (e.g. maintain healthy eating and sleeping habits, rest, exercise, connect with friends, family, colleagues).

"Remember to seek support if you notice yourself experiencing significant feelings of distress."



Sporting Clubs, Port Bute Broughton Combined Sporting Club, Alford Tennis Club, Maitland Golf Club and the SSAA SA Moonta branch have won grants through the Community Recreation and Sports Facilities Program.

Planning for the Barunga West Council projects began last year when

#### **Golf, shooting clubs** set for big upgrades

Maitland Golf Club is set for an upgraded irrigation system with the help of a \$26,000 state grant.

'Our current irrigation system was installed more than 25 years ago and we are well overdue for a new one," Jarrett said.

"We've been having quality issues with calcium in our water so we needed to address it."

Jarrett said the upgrade would be of benefit to the whole community.

"Lots of people use the walking trail around the course so it should benefit the whole town," he said.

"The course basically wraps around Maitland, so it helps to keep the town looking green.

"We should be able to upgrade the quality of all 18 holes and even out the playing surface.

"I think we'll start works after the opening (seasonal) rains this year — we will meet at the start of February to discuss contractors.

"I thank Golf SA, club secretary Andy Hollams for applying for the grant, and the state government for awarding the funding."

Sporting Shooters Association SA Moonta branch received \$50,000 through the grant program to construct a new clubhouse including all-access amenities.

Together with an additional \$38,000 from SSAA and \$10,000 from the recently folded Moonta Dart Club, the facilities are set to be worth almost \$100.000.

President Paul Zadow said the club has been able to refine its applications after about three years of trying to secure

"(The funding) will allow us to complete a full clubhouse with a kitchen, toilets and shower, allowing us to hold interclub and state shooting titles," Zadow said.

'We haven't been able to use our previous clubhouse for about two years, so this will be a huge upgrade."

Zadow said it was important socialising remained a big part of the sport.

"We have a diverse group of members who wouldn't usually come together, but we all share a common interest," he said.

"I'm hoping the facilities will draw people in and build on our camaraderie.

'We have full council approval (for the clubhouse) and we're hoping to finalise local contractors soon.

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# World records for Hugo Taheny

Point Turton's Hugo Taheny continues to smash glass ceilings.

In the past four months the man they call "Hugo Rockstar" has become a dual world record holder, despite increasing concerns about Covid-19.

In early November, Taheny set a new discus world record for athletes living with Down Syndrome, throwing 31.33 metres.

The throw — which was a personal best by 1.22m — elevated Taheny to the number one spot in the International Association for Athletes with Down Syndrome ranking.

Taheny was back to breaking records this year, heading to Adelaide on Saturday, January 15.

This time he broke the world record for shot-put, throwing throwing 11.20m — a personal best by 59cm.

The trip was also the first time Taheny had left the family property since before Christmas, a devastating but important measure according to

Taheny, 20, had severe reactions to both doses of his Covid-19 vaccinations — including an eight-day stay in hospital following the second and is ineligible for a booster shot.

"It's beginning to get really difficult to manage, we have had to cancel his 21st birthday party which was a milestone he was very excited about," Louise said.

# Footy trainers have never been more valuable

With winter sporting competitions fast approaching, many local clubs have been left scraping for volunteers once again.

A shortage of qualified trainers has led to significant struggles for football and netball clubs, including at Kadina and Wallaroo where they have limited personnel.

Wallaroo stalwart Geoff "Joffa" Jarman has been helping out around WFC for more than 35 years and continues to pick up odd jobs when required.

Jarman, 69, mainly assists as a trainer, but can also be seen organising water bottles for all teams on Saturdays and helping the juniors develop skills at trainings.

"Some of my jobs include sanitising and filling up water bottles, cleaning changerooms and helping kids with skills like kicking and leading patterns," Jarman said.

"I really enjoy seeing the development of our kids, some of whom had fathers I coached too."

A talented junior footballer, Jarman captained Central District to an SANFL under 19 premiership in 1970, before winning another flag with Central's reserves the following year.

He went on to play 19 league games for CDFC including a win where he gathered 29 disposals whilst standing Port Adelaide legend Russell Ebert.

Jarman took on a role as playing coach of Wallaroo in 1985 and won a club best and fairest as a 35 year old, before an Achilles injury ended his career.

Ever since, Jarman has worked tirelessly around the club, earning him Yorke Peninsula Country Times Club Person of the Year honours in 2019.

He has widely been commended as one of few Adelaide-based players to cement themselves at the club after retiring.

"Sticking around has been very rewarding — I've been around footy for 60 years so it's all I really know," Jarman

#### Henderson's dedication to the Bloodhounds

Long-time Kadina Football Club trainer Ian Henderson said he has strapped more joints than his players have

Henderson, 67, accumulated ample experience as a trainer at clubs including Central District, South Augusta, Roxby Districts and East Fremantle in the WAFL, before making Kadina his home

He assumed the role of head trainer in 2006 and still enjoys learning about new medical ideas and practices.

"I've enjoyed helping players through rehab and trying to work through niggles they pick up," he said.

Some of the worst injuries I've seen include a dislocated hip — which the surgeon said was equivalent to major road traffic trauma, a snapped tibia, fibula and dislocated ankle at the same time, and an open finger dislocation where the bone was poking right out of the skin."

For the majority of his career, Henderson has remained a South Australian Sports Medicine Association level 2 qualified trainer which has required first aid training every year.

He is also the Yorke Peninsula assessment trainer and is qualified to tick off aspiring trainers hoping to volunteer at their local clubs.

Henderson's years of dedicated service earned him YPCT Club Person of the Year honours in 2006 and even an invitation to the Brownlow Medal in 2009.

"I attended the Brownlow after party and watched Brendon Fevola (jokingly) attack Chris Judd," he said.

"I actually strapped Juddy's shoulder in the U19 Teal Cup in Victoria when I flew over to help out as an East Fremantle trainer."

Henderson said he has loved seeing

his former U10s players grow into senior

"Last year we had about five players from our (2019-20) senior colts premiership go up and play A grade which was great to see," he said.

"Being YPFL head trainer for the past five years has been a highlight because I've been able to watch the best of the best A graders and U17s represent our league.

Trainers have lots of transferable skills which can help people to not panic when you see someone go down and to help injury prevention.

"The social side is also really rewarding you're right in the action on the boundary line and the only non-player or coach allowed in the changerooms."

Henderson said most trainers go unpaid but are usually the most qualified people at local footy clubs.

"Trainers are in such short supply nowadays that they've never been more important to clubs," he said.







## Harris reflects on state captaincy

This month marks 25 years since lower Yorke Peninsula export Daniel "Doc" Harris captained the state under 17 side.

The national championships ran from January 6 to 17 and were held in Brisbane with Harris joined by fellow future first-class cricketers Ben Cameron, Andrew Crook and Paul Rolfe.

Harris's deputy was triple Bradman Medallist and current Adelaide Strikers/Scorpions coach Luke Williams while former Adelaide Crow Ken McGregor was a top order batsman and Norwood champion Scott Borlace also featured.

"I reckon I went away on four underage national championships trips," Harris said.

"At that tournament we finished

"What I do remember is we really needed a win against Northern Territory and I needed

"I nicked one to second slip and I was waiting for the umpire to give me out, and much to my amazement he didn't put his fin-

"The next year we won the under 19s national championship in Melbourne.

"I have a vivid memory of beating the Queenslanders at the MCG and using the Australian dressing room."

Harris toured England with the Australian under 19 side just two vears later.

"I was batting alongside Michael Clarke and Adam Voges, with a young quick Mitchell Johnson sending them down," he

"That was among the most exciting seven and half weeks of my life.

"Along with my dad, I had excellent junior coaches like Don Snook and Graham Gutsche who were strong early influences on me in my junior cricket."

Harris made his first-class debut in 1999-2000 and played 58 first class matches for the Redbacks, captaining his state six times while also becoming a practising medical practitioner.

He took some time to cement his place in the Sheffield Shield side, but made 3329 first class runs, predominately batting at the top of the order, at a respectable average of 31.11.

Harris produced five first class hundreds with a top score of 166, and a further 21 half-centuries.

He played in 49 one-day fixtures including the Redbacks' last title in 2011-12.

"On reflection I would have liked to have been involved in a more successful era at the Redbacks," Harris said.

"Across my time, I think our highest finish in the Sheffield Shield was third and we never played in a final."

Harris developed into a strong performer of the twenty20 game during the early years of the for-

In the 2010-11 KFC Twenty20 Big Bash knockout competition, ing run scorer, with 304 at an average 60.80 and a strike rate of

South Australia, with international players Kieron Pollard and Adil Rashid, defeated NSW in the final by eight wickets the same

The T20 format took Harris to New Zealand, Sri Lanka and to the Deccan Chargers in the Indian Premier League.

Harris played for Woodville in SACA's A grade (now first grade) competition and helped the side win its first flag in 30 years in 2007-08.

He claimed the David Hookes Medal the next year when the Peckers went back-to-back.

Harris missed the final in 2011-12 because of his IPL commitments, but was a key member of the side.

For the lad who started his cricket at Sunbury, everything has turned full circle as Harris is coaching his son Matthew in under 12s at the Walkerville Cats.





## Genetic discovery improves wheat breeding

AUSTRALIAN and European researchers have discovered a genetic element in a common wheat pathogen which has the potential to streamline breeding of disease-resistant wheat.

Researchers from the Centre for Crop and Disease Management along with collaborators from CSIRO, the Max Planck Institute of Germany and the University of Neuchâtel of Switzerland, discovered a variable genetic element within the fungal pathogen causing Septoria nodorum blotch.

The team found this element has the ability to control the production of Tox1 - atoxic molecule produced after infection and is responsible for major damage to sensitive wheat varieties.

The element varies in the amount of Tox1 production in pathogen strains from different regions, helping breeders prioritise which gene to remove according to the environment they are targeting.

CCDM researcher and recent PhD graduate Dr Evan John said the Australian version of the wheat pathogen produced much higher levels of Tox1 than most other fungal strains collected from the Northern Hemisphere.

"After noticing the variation of Tox1, I collected data on the pathogen's genome from fungal samples collected from different countries to work out why this was happening," Dr John said.

"I was then able to pinpoint and characterise the genetic element that allowed the pathogen to produce high levels of Tox1.

"This was widespread in Australian fungal strains of the disease but at low level in most US and European strains.


"We've been able to show the pathogen has evolved to Australian conditions and can strongly recommend the removal of the Tox1 susceptible wheat gene called Snn1 from Australian breeding lines, to breed resistant wheat suited to local regions."

CCDM project leader Dr Kar-Chun Tan said the finding explains the extreme difficulty of breeding disease resistant wheat.

"The discovery of the genetic element helps to explain the huge variability in toxic molecule production that exists out in the field," Dr Tan said.

"While it is difficult to account for the variability in the breeding program, the good news is we can now monitor the genetic element that causes the variability and see how it changes over time and in different regions of Australia.

"The monitoring will allow us to advise breeders and pathologists on the best and most genetically relevant SNB isolates to use for screening their wheat lines for SNB resistance."

The 90-minute HBO special from 2015 delves into the man who was always rather prickly with the media.


Every key moment of his career is captured, his comical height advantage and immense stardom at an early age; even the development of his signature skyhook.

To give you an insight on how dominant Abdul-Jabbar was, the NCAA introduced rules to reduce his impact, including banning dunking for several years.

Wallaroo: There are two grain ships waiting offshore so anglers can expect access to only the shallow end of the jetty in coming days. A few squid and just-legal blue crabs have been the main reports. Boat crews are chasing King George whiting in the early mornings south of Bird Reef, and gar and squid from Point Riley. Local beaches are worth a try for yellowfin whiting.

Moonta Bay/Port Hughes: Crews reported good catches of KG whiting, gar and squid in recent days from as far afield as West Light. Steamer channel and Warburto Point. Jetty and shore-based anglers tested their skills for yellowfin whiting, squid and garfish.

Balgowan/Port Victoria: KG whiting have been the go-to species again for locals and visitors when the persistent on-shore southerlies allowed a launch, especially from the problematic ramp at Balgowan, Big squid are also a feature off Wardang Island for those fishing early mornings in the clear weather.

Point Turton: On-water marine conditions were just superb when I cruised through last Friday morning, almost balmy, as boat crews impatiently launched for KG whiting, squid and garfish. High tide produced yellowfin whiting

from The Pines, gar at Port Rickaby and large snook at Corny Point

Marion Bay/Stenhouse Bay: Big squid have again been reported from the Stenhouse Bay ietty during the week. The on-shore winds are driving anglers nuts (me included) but there have been occasions in the early mornings at Marion Bay when crews managed a quick fish for flathead, big squid, red nannygai and snook in close to shore. Gym Beach is worth a try for

salmon just under a kilo. Edithburgh: Snook, bluevs and squid were caught out from Klein Point and Coobowie over the weekend. The ietty has tommy ruff (Australian herring), while off-shore crews caught whiting and flathead from Tapley Shoals.

Stansbury/Port Vincent: Medium-sized blueys are off the broken grounds adjacent to the town's foreshore caravan park. A few gar are north out from Port Vincent and vellowfin whiting are schooling in and around those small bays at The Hut and old oyster reefs. The Orontes Bank has legal KG whiting at first light.

Ardrossan: Ouite a few blue crab rakers have been sighted at locations north and south of Ardrossan in recent days. Bluevs are also at the main jetty, while boat crews have managed gar, squid and bluevs from Gus Shoal.

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# **SPORT** SHUT DOWN

Southern Yorke Peninsula Bowling and Basketball Associations are the latest sports to be hit by Covid-19 cancellations.

The bowling association has cancelled all pennant competitions until the end of January while the basketball association has withdrawn teams from the SA Country Championships and called off matches on Friday, January 14.

Bowling association chairperson Leith Daniell said the decision was made in response to the gradual increase in case numbers.

"We kept an eye on the numbers in the YP Council area, and have had at least five clubs with people in isolation — not necessarily with Covid, just as close contacts," Daniell said.

"So the executive decided to close down competition until February."

Bowls SA introduced a Covid-19 vaccination policy on January 10, a move welcomed by both local asso-

It is hoped the SYP association can pick up at least one Saturday; however, occasions such as a state event the week before Easter, will make it difficult, according to Daniell.

No points will be awarded for any cancelled matches.

"We'll consult with clubs when we know more, which will hopefully be early next week," Daniell said.

"We have a duty of care to the members and to the association to keep people safe."

Basketball league administrator Lindsay McCulloch said a decision would be made on Wednesday or Thursday as to whether games would be played this week.

"We have some young adults concerned about taking Covid home to their young children who are unable to be vaccinated," McCulloch said.

"We will award draws for all matches missed until it returns to competition."

Yorke Valley Basketball Association also cancelled its matches last week. The league has urged all clubs to prepare for round 13 as normal, but its executive is set to make a firm decision on Thursday, January

"We understand some clubs are concerned and some are keen to play, but deciding on Thursday will give them all time to decide their positions," president Trevor Talbot said.

All matches missed across round 12 have been deemed draws.





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
